AND AWAY WE GO: June will be Air National Guard month for some 700 members of the Kentucky units attending annual field training in various locations. About 600 of these will be going to the permanent training site at Garden City, Ga. and some 60 remaining at Shewmaker between June 10-24. One officer will go to Tyndall AFB, Fla., one officer and five enlisted men to Bergstrom AFB, Tx., three airmen to Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, and four officers and nine enlisted men to MacDill Air Force Base Fla. Some 155 of those going to Travis Field, Ga. will be travelling by military air transport furnished by the Georgia Air National Guard. The C-124 transports are scheduled to arrive Friday, June 9 and loading of materiel begin early Saturday morning.

REPORTING IN: The pay muster will be at 1 p.m. Sunday, June 11, at Savannah and steps will be taken to provide a noon meal in the base mess beginning at 11:30 a.m. As previously announced, there will be both Protestant and Roman Catholic services that morning for any who are present. The working hours of the day at camp are 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., and the major thrust will be a flying schedule of 10 sorties in the morning and 10 in the afternoon.
