## FRYMIRE KEEPS AIR GUARD MISSION

The National Guard Bureau informed Gen Frymire that the 123rd Tactical Reconnaissance Group would continue to fly RF 101 "Voodoos", and to continue their mission of tactical photo reconnaissance\*. This was brought about through the persistent efforts of Maj Gen Frymire, the Adjutant General, by correspondence, telephone calls and personal contacts.

Earlier this year in a force structure change it was announced that the Kentucky Air Guard would change to a fighter unit effective on or about 1 July 1972. They would fly A-37 Attack aircraft in close support of ground troops. The A-37 is a fine airplane and easy to maintain. However, acceptance of this mission would have resulted in a loss of 27 Air Technicians and 180 military authorizations. The National Guard Bureau could offer no immediate relief in giving us an additional unit to offset the loss. General Frymire pointed out that it was unfair for Kentucky, with its populations and recruiting potential, to be so drastically reduced in Air National Guard Strength.

\* The 123rd Wing, with headquarters in Louisville also continues in the reconnaissance mission.

## WHITE HOUSE TO APPOINT NG OFFICERS

Appointment of Army National Guard officers in the commissioned grades above major will be made by the President and with the advice and consent of the Senate under Public Law 92-129, effective 28 September 71.

The National Guard Bureau advised states to continue present procedures concerning the processing of requests for federal recognition, according to a December 21 NGB Messageform.

During January, March, May, July, September, and November, the NGB will provide consolidated rosters of recommended officers requiring Senate confirmation to the Commanding General, Reserve Component Personnel and Administrative Center, St. Louis, Mo., in the extension of federal recognition.

## BEAN SOUP FEAST TO SUPPORT BOYS CAMP

The Kentucky National Guard held its Second Annual Bean Soup Feast during May to help send Kentucky youngsters to one week camps in Greenville, Kentucky.

Last year the Kentucky Guard collected \$16,031 which sent approximately 180 young men to camp during the summer. This year \$18,000 has been set as the goal in order to give a larger number of young men an opportunity to attend camp. The next edition of the Guardsman will carry a report of money made by each unit of the Kentucky Guard.

The camp program is designed to provide supervised wholesome activities for young men to participate in, while integrating patriotic, traditional, and purposeful views of the American way of life.

Youths will get the opportunity to become involved in various programs such as team handball, football, baseball, drug abuse programs, character guidance clinics and field trips.

Members of the various units of the Kentucky National Guard, both air and army, will act as Camp Staff members. A total of seventeen staff members are needed for each camp session. Each session starts on Wednesday and ends the following Tuesday, starting 5, 12, and 19 July.

A stipend of \$50 will be paid each volunteer for his week's work, with the exception of the cooks who will be paid the equivalent of their enlisted military grade.

Volunteers needed are Youth Counselors (6), Qualified Bus Drivers (2), Qualified Red Cross Life Guard (1), Mess Stewart (1), and Cooks (3).

Anyone wishing to volunteer for a particular week are requested to fill out the form shown on page 4, and mail it to LTC Armando J. Alfaro, State Project Officer.

## DRAFTING THE GUARD NIXED

In 1631, Governor Endicott of Massachusetts declared from England "have all planters and servants instructed in the use of arms, and designate certain days for training." This was the birth of the American Militia which, in 1903, with the passage of the Dick Bill, became known as the National Guard.

Since the beginning of this country, the National Guard has been the TRUE all-volunteer Army.

Despite rumors that a draft would be initiated for the National Guard, Defense Secretary Melvin Laird reaffirmed the all-volunteer concept of the Guard during Congressional hearings last month. Laird indicated, "I do not want to press for a draft authorization unless that becomes absolutely essential, and I do not think that it is at this point."

A recent issue of "Army Times" reported the Defense Department was scheduled to send a Reserve incentive package that will include enlistment and reenlistment bonuses that could total as much as \$3300 per man. The "Times" concluded that swift congressional action is likely.

## AIR GUARD "STARS"

The National Guard Bureau has authorized closed circuit television training equipment for Air National Guard Units. This equipment will utilize prerecorded training tapes, made by professionals. Lt Col McClure, 123d Group Commander, plans to use local officers and airmen for training programs to be recorded at Shevemaker. All training programs will be shown on the 9 monitors located throughout the base.

If found to be feasible the fixed cameras will be used for base security during off-duty hours. The monitors will be located where security guards can constantly observe most of the area.

## COMMANDERS RECEIVE HELP

In an effort to help company commanders in the Army National Guard improve their overall readiness and training posture, a full-time Operations, Training and Readiness Specialist has been authorized for headquarters elements, battalion and higher.

The job of the specialists will be to help commanders prepare training directives, operations orders and plans, and readiness reports. Their job also will include assisting in collecting, interpreting and evaluating reports to determine training readiness of units and individuals.

## 138th ARTILLERY GROUP RECEIVED BADGE

The HHB 138th Artillery Group, located in Lexington, has now been granted a distinctive insignia badge by The Institute of Heraldry, Alexandria, Virginia.



The description of the badge, shown above, is of a gold color metal and enamel device 1 1/8 inches in height overall consisting of a vertical gold cannon barrel, the breech overlapping a blue grass area in base and the barrel surmounted by a gold gunner's quadrant angle up and plumb bob extending below breech, all with a scarlet enamel scroll arced across barrel below muzzle, and outwards and downwards at the sides, the left portion inscribed, "READY IN," the top portion inscribed, "PEACE," and the right portion inscribed, "AND WAR," all in gold letters.

The symbolism of the badge is scarlet and yellow (gold), the colors used for Artillery. The gunner's quadrant and cannon are symbolic of control and direction and refer to the overall mission. The bluegrass is representative of Kentucky's Lexington area, and refers to the unit's home.

## FULL-TIME SGLI PROPOSED FOR GUARDSMEN

Hearings were conducted on Capitol Hill last week on a bill that will cost the American taxpayer nothing, but will provide a new membership incentive and benefit to the National Guard and Reserve.

Testifying on behalf of the National Guard before a House Sub-committee on Veterans Affairs, Col. James B. Deerin, Executive Vice President of the National Guard Association, interpreted the significance of H.R.13168, fulltime Servicemen's Group Life Insurance, introduced by Congressman G. V. (Sonny) Montgomery (Miss.).

"... if enacted," Colonel Deerin explained to the Sub-committee, the Bill, "will in our view serve two important ends. It will provide a well-merited measure of protection to the families of men who are serving their country through active participation in the Ready Reserve. Additionally, it will enhance the nation's ability to maintain an effective Ready Reserve by providing a worthwhile incentive to enlistment and continued service.

"... First," he pointed out, "it provides continuous coverage, at moderate costs, for Guardsmen and Reservists who are actively participating in units that conduct a minimum of 12 periods of training per year. Although the final actuarial computations have not been completed, we are led to believe that \$15,000 coverage can be provided for a monthly premium of about \$3.

"For many young Guardsmen and Reservists, this therefore may be the only insurance available to them within a price range they can afford. Since approximately two thirds of all Guardsmen are married and bear family responsibilities, both the low cost and the family security will be important considerations. These factors bear out the survey findings that fulltime SGLI coverage will weigh heavily in decisions to enlist, reenlist, or extend terms of service...."

Presently, Reserve Component personnel may retire with 20 years service, but do not actually start receiving retired pay until age 60. If they die in the interim, no part of their retirement security can be paid to their survivor.
