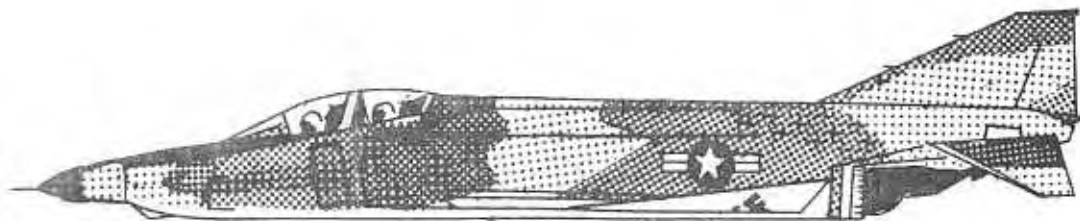




# THE PHANTOM'S EYE

DAVIDSON NAMED DEPUTY AG: Taylor L. Davidson, formerly director of the Kentucky Selective Service System and a veteran member of the Air National Guard, has taken the oath of office as Kentucky's new deputy adjutant general. Promoted from colonel to brigadier general, he assumed the post March 1 in Frankfort. General Davidson served as director of the selective service program in Kentucky for 10 years, including the period of the Vietnam War, until the draft was discontinued. He then moved to the national headquarters of the system and had been serving in that capacity since. A graduate of the University of Kentucky, he started his military career with the Air Corps in 1942 and served in the South Pacific theater. Davidson won his commission in the Kentucky National Guard in 1947 and transferred to the Air Guard in 1952, mainly serving as a member of State Headquarters staff. For that period until he moved to the selective service program, he also was the full-time air technician officer on the staff of the adjutants general of Kentucky.

QUEBBEMAN RETIRES AS ASSISTANT AG: Brig. Gen. Lawrence A. Quebbeman, a veteran member of the Kentucky Air Guard and most recently the assistant adjutant general for air, retires this month. General Quebbeman has had a distinguished career with the KyANG, flying all of the tactical aircraft from the Mustang through the Voodoos. As squadron and group commander, and finally wing commander, he led the tactical units to several honors, including a plaque won by the deployed 165th Tac Recon Squadron from the commander of 5th Air Force during the activation period when the unit was in Japan and Korea. He was named assistant adjutant general under Richard L. Frymire.

TOMORROW IS CHAPLAIN HISLE DAY: Dedication services will be held tomorrow in honor of the late wing chaplain, Lt. Col. William Edwin Hisle, who served the unit for many years. Activities will begin with an 8 a.m. Commanders Call. Chapel services start at 9 a.m. with a special organ recital, to be followed by the regular order of worship led by Chaplain Williams. General Quebbeman, and MSgt. Eslie Black, both of whom were associated with Chaplain Hisle for many years, will deliver remarks. In attendance will be Mrs. Helen Hisle, members of the family, and Verne M. Yahne, retired former detachment and wing commander. Highlight of the occasion will be the dedication of a new electronic organ to be used in chapel services here. Chaplain Hisle died Sept. 19, 1971, of an illness which first became evident in 1968 while he was was service on active duty in Korea.

**KYANG RECRUITING CAR WINS:** The recruiting car has already chalked up a trophy without even roaring down the raceway according to SSgt. Gary Ezell, leader recruiter. The First Place Trophy in the Carl Casper Custom Car Exhibitor's Class was presented at the close of a three-day custom car show on Feb. 26 at the Kentucky State Fair Grounds. The 1977 white Granada with red and blue trim beat out over 30 other entries in the competition. The car is also marked with the Bicentennial logo on the doors and the U.S. Flag and Air Guard Emblem on the back trunk lid. Tomorrow the Recruiting Car and its driver Andy Vertrees will be on display in front of the hangar. Vertrees was selected to represent the unit because of his outstanding record of usually finishing in the top three point standings for State Fair Grounds racing competition. The 1978 racing season's first warmup will commence at the fair grounds on March 19 and 26. Vertrees will race at least once a week from April 1 to the end of September, the recruiting office pointed out. The car will also make appearances at Bowling Green and Owensboro, KY., and Salem, IN.
