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## WELCOME TO TRAVIS FIELD, SAVANNAH, GEORGIA : A LITTLE ABOUT THE AREA

Savannah, Georgia, population 143,000 is one of the most beautiful and historic cities in the south. It is situated on the south bank of the Savannah River. It has the grace of a well-established city blended with the progress and tempo of living that naturally accompanies a thriving industrial seaport. Several resorts including Savannah Beach and Wilmington Island, are nearby. Armstrong State College is in the city. The first settlement of the city was by General James Edward Oglethorpe and a band of English settlers. It was the first settlement in the state of Georgia. Savannah, considered to be one of the first planned cities in North America, was designed by General Oglethorpe and Colonel William Bull. Laid out on a spacious scale, the city derives much of its charm from its cobblestone riverfront, broad avenues and many squares shaded by majestic oak trees. Owen-Thomas House, on Oglethorpe Square, was designed by William Jay. It is an excellent example of Federal architecture. Telfair Academy of Arts and Sciences, W. State and Bernard Sts., occupies the old Telfair residence on the site of the governor's royal mansion.

Savannah, which is noted for its splendid harbor, has had a rapid industrial growth in recent years. Its plants now number more than 300 and the city is the center of the expanding southern pulp and paper business. Union Camp Corporation, 2 1/2 miles northwest between U.S. 17 and the Savannah River, is said to be the world's largest pulp and paper mill and bag factory.

A scenic tour of Savannah follows a carefully marked route outlined by signs. While visitors may start at any point along the route, it is suggested that the tour begin at the Chamber of Commerce, 100 E. Bay Street, where a map may be obtained.

DRY CLEANING ON BASE: Dry cleaning service on base will be available between the hours of 1500 and 1730 Monday thru Friday. The Dry Cleaning Building is located in Building 290, Room #4. This building is the same building that your lined was distributed.

HUNTER AFB FACILITIES AVAILABLE: A large Base exchange is available to the men of the Kentucky Air National Guard at nearby Hunter AB. You will be required to have your red ID and a copy of your orders in order to get in. You will find this BX far more complete than the one you will find here at Travis. Many money saving buys can be made here. The main BX at Hunter is opened Monday thru Friday from 0900 until 1730 and on Saturday from 0900 until 1600. CLOTHING SALES AT HUNTER: This facility will be opened between the hours of 1730 and 1600 Monday thru Friday, except Wednesday when it is closed.
