

REPORT OF THE ADJUTANT GENERAL

TO

THE GOVERNOR.

ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1909.

To His Excellency,
AUGUSTUS E. WILLSON,
Governor of Kentucky.

SIR:

The General Government pays at this time, \$79,139.45, nearly four-fifths of the cost of maintaining our Militia. This money must be expended for arms, equipment, instruction and for the promotion of rifle practice. The numerous expenses that may not be paid out of the funds allotted to us by the Government must be met by the State. Some of the States give as much as \$125.00 per man for the training and maintenance of the militia, while some give as low as \$8.00. Kentucky gives on the basis of 2,000 men, \$10.00 per man: The general average is between \$41.00 and \$45.00.

The soldier to meet the obligations of his enlistment and do his part to entitle the State to its share of the help given by the Government to the States for the benefit of the Militia, must give close attention to drill discipline and the care of all property issued to him. The officers to meet the responsibilities and duties of their respective positions must study the laws and regulations, keep orders in mind, be strictly obedient to them and fit themselves to be at all times examples and teachers for the men. The day of the tin soldier has passed—now every one, both officers and men, are expected to reach a high standard of practical utility. Many of the States have provided moderate pay to recompense for the labor necessary to meet these

advanced requirements. This at once establishes a just system of rewards and a means of punishment for violating the minor exactions of discipline, which must be rigidly enforced, leaving no doubt in the soldier's mind as to the duty of obedience when confronted with more serious conditions. This demand alone, if met, will require an expenditure of not less than \$25,000 per annum. The volunteers of Kentucky are courageous, patient, untiring and obedient when active duty is to be performed, but they do not submit with the utmost cheerfulness to the routine work of the armory and camp, yet it is essential to effectiveness.

Thorough drill and discipline will easily make the Kentucky soldier the peer of any in the world. The basis of this soldierly training is the enforcement of discipline and obedience in all the little things that go to make up a soldier's life. As it is, the leverage is not sufficient, but with the pay suggested, a fund would be in hand from which fines could be deducted which would in a mild way inculcate the habit of care in these foundation matters. Efforts are being made to induce the Federal Government to pay the Militia of the different States for the time they necessarily take from their private interests, and it may, if desirable, finally do so, but it is a question worthy of consideration, if it is not an obligation of the State, the burden of which she had better bear. Our volunteers, no matter where located, belong to the entire State, and a County furnishing the men for a company should not be penalized for its public spirit by being required to pay more than its fair proportion for the maintenance of the company. The law requiring a County to furnish the armory for a company raised in its limits is unjust. Troops on duty, whether at home or abroad, represent the entire State, and the armories ought to be furnished by the State. Ohio with about three times our enlisted strength appropriated \$400,000 for armories which appropriation made by a Republican General Assembly was promptly approved by the present Democratic Governor. Other States have made similar provisions; If the State does not see fit to own its armories, if it would appropriate the minimum amount necessary to secure suitable accommodations, and let what the Counties furnish, be in addition, it would meet the present urgent needs in that direction. All armories receiving State aid to be for the exclusive use of the troops; outside control enables the power exercising it to negative the orders of the State and the Government and cannot consistently be tolerated.

We are required to keep on hand everything necessary to equip the entire guard for active duty. The room in the arsenal is not sufficient; we have been compelled to find outside storage for wagons and ambulances and have temporarily placed a large number of boxes containing shoes and overcoats, in the basement of the Capitol. We hope to arrange to get the shoes and overcoats back to the Arsenal in a brief time, but it seems quite impossible to store everything we are compelled to keep, and have working room in the Arsenal, unless it is enlarged.

My information is, that the walls of the building are strong enough for the addition of another story, that the roof is trussed and can be raised without taking it to pieces. This improvement would add one third to the floor space and ought to be made for one thousand or fifteen hundred dollars. I hope it will be provided for, as early as possible.

It is already provided by the statutes that the Acts of Congress for the government of the militia of the United States, are in force in this State, that the Articles of War and the laws governing the army of the United States, shall, as far as applicable, be a part of the State law. They also provide that whenever any portion of the Kentucky State Guard shall be ordered into active service, the rules and articles of war and the general regulations for the government of the army of the United States shall be considered in force and regarded as a part of the State law during the continuance of such service.

These simple provisions placing our militia under the same laws and regulations that govern the armies of the United States subject to such modifications as the Governor may direct, with the authority vested in him as Commander-in-chief of the Militia, to make and publish such regulations as will increase the discipline and efficiency of the Kentucky State Guard, enables him to meet the many contingencies that arise, in the administration of military affairs, according to the rules and precedents of tested fairness and wisdom, laid down in army regulations.

It is better to accept and enforce them, than to attempt the confusing work of grafting on the system, discordant ideas, that would place the Kentucky soldier at a distinct disadvantage, when in case of war, they are called into the general service.

The militia of nearly all the States are now called the National Guard. Kentucky should fall in line in this particular.

An effort is now being made to teach every man who carries a gun, and the officers in command, to shoot, and hit the object aimed at. \$12,714.77 of our allotment is set apart for this purpose, and we are making fairly good headway.

It has been determined after estimating the cost of transportation and the superior opportunities for instruction afforded by the establishment of a range convenient for each regiment, to have three permanent ranges with camp sites, rather than one. Suitable ground was found at Earlington, Ky. for the Third Regiment, the use of which was donated by the St. Bernard Mining Company. On this ground a first class regimental range has been established at a cost of \$7,500.00.

We have acquired near the city of Frankfort, for Camp of Instruction and Target Practice, a lease to the State of 91 acres of land, at a rental of \$5.00 per acre, and have expended in fitting it up, \$1,700.

We are now perfecting a lease to the Government of a tract of 208 acres of land near Louisville, adapted for the uses of a Rifle Range and Camp of Instruction, at a rental of \$2.10 per acre.

This system of ranges will secure better results than could be had from a single range necessarily distant from two of the regiments, and it is expected with these facilities, Kentucky troops will before long attain a high standard of efficiency in target practice.

It is in many States, and ought to be here, an offence punished by fine and imprisonment, for any person other than officer or enlisted man of the Organized Militia, or of the United States service, to wear at any time, the uniform of such service, or any part of it, or a uniform or any part of it, similar thereto.

It should also be a penal offence for a member of the Organized Militia to wear the uniform or any part of it, at any time unless under orders from competent authority. This would save the loss and abuse of much property. A responsibility and an honor should attach to the uniform, and no person, not a soldier should be permitted to wear it. To permit it to be worn promiscuously, as is now done, robs it of its honor, and destroys the identity and responsibility of the wearer, by confusing him with other persons who have neither pride or interest in maintaining the distinction that belongs to it.

Some of our schools, both white and colored, have adopted a part

or all of the uniform of the army. These students are fine young fellows, but they are not enlisted men, are not soldiers, and should not be confused with men who are. The uniform should proclaim the truth, and it is a mistake to have our young men assume false appearances. Many of them are receiving military training, and will in time, properly put on the uniform and wear it with honor.

The colleges should each have its distinctive uniform, if any, proclaiming the connection and responsibility of the wearer, and avoid having the soldiers responsible for the acts of students, or the students responsible for the acts of the soldiers, by a confusion of uniforms.

I transmit herewith the report of Lieutenant-Colonel Thomas W. Woodyard, on duty in the Quartermaster's department of this office, who has looked after the claims for service of Kentucky Troops in the Spanish American War. On December 10th, 1907, there was on deposit to the credit of the Governor, for the payment of such of these troops as had not already been paid in full, \$22,340.56. which amount was transferred by the outgoing to the incoming Governor; to date \$13,501.73 of this fund has been disbursed. On December 10, 1907, 1143 soldiers remained unpaid, of whom 641 have since been paid, and we are still trying to locate the remaining 502 or their lawful heirs. The balance to the credit of the Governor at this time, is \$9,882.41, against which there are outstanding checks for \$253.21.

These matters are clearly set forth in detail by Colonel Woodyard in his report, accompanied by a complete list of the soldiers to whom money is yet due, and the amount due each one.

I also submit herewith the report of Judge Wm. L. Jett who has special charge under the Adjutant General, of the work of collecting all data obtainable concerning the different organizations that enlisted or served from Kentucky in the Army of the Confederate States. The progress made in this work is set forth in said report. The Adjutant General was also directed by statute to have the muster rolls of the First, Second, Third and Fourth Kentucky Volunteers, and the two troops of Cavalry that served in the War with Spain, recorded and printed. This work which made much progress under my predecessors, has been completed by Judge Jett. The printed books are on sale with State Librarian at one dollar per copy, free copies having been furnished, one each to the County Clerks of this State, and to the Adjutant Generals of the several States.

I also furnish herewith the report of Lieutenant-Colonel A. Mc-

Lean Moffat of the Inspector General's Department, showing the present strength and organization of our militia, and a condensed statement of the rifle practice had during the past year: Also a report from Lieutenant Colonel Thomas W. Woodyard of the Quartermaster's Department, with an inventory of the quantity and kind of public arms equipment and stores now in the State arsenal, what arms and stores have been withdrawn by order of the Governor, and also what portion of the said public property thus withdrawn has been recovered, or wrongfully injured, and the amounts paid therefor.

I also transmit herewith the reports of Colonel Jouett Henry, Colonel J. Embry Allen and Colonel Harry C. Grinstead, showing the number, condition and efficiency of their respective regiments at the encampments held last summer and fall.

SIR:—

Pursuant to G. O. No. 15, A. G. O. of date July 29, 1909, I have the honor to make report of the tour of duty of this regiment under that order at Camp J. Franklin Bell, near Frankfort, August 21st, to 30th, both inclusive as follows:

My regiment left its home station on August 21st, and arrived at West Frankfort as per schedule in heavy marching order, wearing the khaki uniform. The regiment was immediately de-trained and marched to the camp ground.

The effective strength of the command as shown by the morning reports, consisted of 39 officers and 367 enlisted men, with 14 officers attached, aggregating 420.

The site of the camp and target range had been most admirably chosen by the Adjutant General, and every facility was afforded for the instruction of the young soldiers.

The sanitation of the camp was very thorough. There was not a single case of serious illness, or accident.

The subsistence as furnished by the commissary department was ample and wholesome. The issue was closely supervised, no waste allowed and the cost of the ration was thus held several cents under the allowance.

The regiment was inspected by Captain O. B. Rosenbaum, 26th Inf. U. S. A., on August 27th, who spent several days in camp affording both men and officers much benefit by his knowledge and encouragement.

Strict discipline was enforced at all times and no complaint was made from any citizen of the conduct of any man or officer during

the encampment. While all the liberty possible was accorded the men, I am glad to be able to report that there was not a single instance in which the indulgence was abused.

Owing to the fact that very few of the commissioned officers had been with their commands more than a few days, the evolutions of the regiment were somewhat crude at first, but notwithstanding the detail of a battalion each day for target practice, the improvement in discipline and practical knowledge during the ten days of instruction was most gratifying.

The innovation of the feature of target practice in connection with the camp of instruction, while curtailing the actual time for instruction in drill, guard duty, etc., was a decided success, for besides teaching the soldier that most essential part of his profession, the actual knowledge of how to shoot, the interest and excitement of the firing line was a beneficial break in the monotony in the routine of the camp of instruction. 48 enlisted men and 7 officers qualified as marksmen, 31 officers and men first class; 33 officers and men second class; 167 officers and men third class. There is no report from the statistical officer as to the number of officers and men who qualified as sharpshooters, but there seems reason to believe there were several.

On August 30th, the camp was turned over to the 2nd Inf. The regiment entrained and proceeding to its home station was relieved from duty.

In conclusion I wish to commend to the department the attached officers who rendered this regiment such valuable assistance and in particular Captain William N. Hughes, U. S. A. under whose able administration as Executive officer of the rifle range such good results were accomplished, and Lieutenant Brick Southworth, 3d Inf. Acting Regimental Commissary.

SIR:—

Pursuant to paragraph 26, G. O. 18, A. G. D. August 11, 1909, I have the honor to submit the following report of the exercises performed by the 2nd Regiment, Kentucky State Guard, during the encampment held at Frankfort, Kentucky, August 31st to September 9, 1909 inclusive of both of said dates:

The Regimental Adjutant, Quartermaster, Commissary and I, arrived at camp, August 30th, pursuant to General Order No. 18. Company "K" of Catlettsburg, arrived on the same date, the remainder of the regiment arriving August 31st. The Regimental Adjutant is preparing a consolidated report of the strength of the regiment to be furnished to your department showing the strength of each organization.

Upon arrival at camp, a routine of duty was prescribed, requiring company drills, battalion drills, fatigue duty and regimental parade each day. Three entire companies were detailed for rifle practice each day and were engaged in that duty the entire day. One company was detailed for guard duty each day. The scope of the drill exercises embraced the usual close order drills by company and by battalion; also extended order drills by company; advance and rear guard formation by company and by battalion; outpost formations and shelter tent pitching by company and by battalion. Colonel Jackson of the army, Inspecting Officer, inspected the various companies and battalions of the regiment in these drills and movements and pronounced them satisfactory.

On September 3rd, by direction of the Adjutant General, and by invitation of the Capital Fair Association, the regiment marched to the fair grounds of the Association and gave a short exhibition drill and held a regimental parade on the fair grounds. The distance to

and from the fair grounds, according to my best information, was about three and one-half miles each way, thus making a practice march of seven miles for the regiment. The march to the fair grounds consumed one hour, from 1:30 to 2:30 p. m., the returning march was made from 4 to 5 p. m. The men made the march with ease and there were no prostrations.

On September 5th, the regiment was inspected in heavy marching order by Colonel Jackson, of the United States Army. The regiment was formed in column of companies at full distance; ranks were opened and the inspecting officer then inspected the arms, clothing and equipment of each soldier, pronouncing the same as being in first class condition in every respect, with the exception of the shoes worn by the men, which he said, in several instances, were not suitable for military use. Your department is aware that the men furnish their own shoes and very naturally, there was no uniformity of shoes. A great many men, however, and most of the officers, had complied with section four, of G. O. 18 by providing themselves with russet shoes, and very few low shoes were noticed. The inspecting officer remarked frequently that the rifles were in excellent condition. After the inspection of clothing and arms the men were required to open their blanket rolls, displaying the meat cans, knives, forks, etc., and other contents of the blanket roll, all of which were inspected by the inspecting officer and pronounced in good condition. The inspecting officer then made a careful inspection of the sanitary conditions of the camp, including the kitchens, eating sheds, provision tents and latrines and said they could not be improved upon. Colonel A. McLean Moffat, of the Inspector General's Department and Captain Charles D. Clay, U. S. Army, retired, accompanied Colonel Jackson in the inspection.

During the course of the encampment, each company was given one day's tour of guard duty.

The entire regiment fired over all three ranges twice, and a large number of the men that showed proficiency were allowed to fire as many as three times in order to qualify if possible.

SIR:—

Pursuant to Par. 26. General Order No. 14, A. G. O. dated Frankfort, Kentucky, 15th of July, 1909. I have the honor to submit a detailed report of the tour of duty performed by the Third Infantry at Camp of Instruction and Rifle Practice, August 9-18 inclusive at Camp Jno. B. Atkinson, Earlington, Ky.

Detraining.

The troops arrived at Earlington as per schedule and detrained promptly and in good order; took up the march to camp and pitched tents quietly, without confusion. The strength of the command as shown by morning report was 477 enlisted men, 42 officers and 5 officers attached, making a total strength of 524. A field return is hereby submitted and made a part of this report.)

Camp Site.

The camp site was a beautiful plateau, well set in grass on high ground about one-half mile from the railroad station, the ground being slightly undulating made the drainage splendid, and the policing of the grounds very easy. Taking it all in all, it is the best site the regiment has ever occupied. Being in easy access of the town, great numbers of citizens attended our ceremonies and drills and came to the band concerts in the evening, which had its tendency to satisfy the men and keep them in camp, besides affording much pleasure to the people.

Drills.

Owing to the large details sent to the Rifle Range each day, the progress I desired was not made in the drills. All officers and men not needed for the Range, were put through both company and battalion drills each day, both in close and extended order, and showed much improvement each day, but on account of the requirements of the Range, they could not have the instruction and work they would otherwise have had. Owing to the newness of many of the subordinate officers and at least sixty per cent of the men never having been in camp before, guard duty at the beginning was poorly executed, but improved wonderfully as the officers and men became familiar with the duties expected of them.

Rifle Practice.

While we did not get the results I had hoped for in this most important work, what was done was done well. It was my desire to have every officer and man serve on the firing line in the pits, and at the scorer's stand and become familiar with every phase of the work on the Range, and this was done. My idea was carried out, but in the doing, much unavoidable delay was caused in the starting each day and time lost from actual firing. While the men did not get as much shooting as I had expected, they did get other instruction on the Range which will be valuable in the future, and I do not believe there is a man in the command now who could not score, mark or work the targets. The report of the Assistant Inspector of Small Arms Practice has not been made up, but it is known that 45 marksmen were qualified and in view of the fact that only 49 marksmen qualified in the entire brigade last year, we have reason to feel encouraged, and taking everything into consideration, the record on the Range is all that could have been expected. The officers and men all showed the greatest interest in the work, and endured without complaint great suffering from the excessive heat.

Attached Officers.

Lt. Col. Moffat, Inspector General's Department, Capt. W. N. Hughes, U. S. A., retired, Capt. Jackson Morris, and Captain Foster Helm, Ordnance Department and Captain Chas. D. Clay, U. S. A. retired, reported pursuant to Par. 13 and 14, of G. O. No. 14. Space

will not allow me to speak as I would like to of the individual work of these officers, and I will only say that they were all active, earnest and patient in the duties assigned them, and they rendered invaluable service, working in harmony with each other and with myself. They are to be commended and I desire that they know their efforts to aid the Third Infantry are duly appreciated.

Health and Sanitation.

No arrangements were made for garbage disposal on the grounds, and at my request the purchasing Quartermaster Commissary and Commissary Major A. G. Chapman furnished civilians and team to haul it away each day. A crematory is much better for this service where it is possible. The latrines were located on each flank of the camp and were covered by common tents. The pits were covered with fresh earth three times each day and in addition disinfected with crude oil and lime three times each day. By this means the flies were reduced to a minimum. The health of the command was practically perfect. The Surgeon Maj. S. S. Watkins reports verbally that it may be said that there was no preventable illness at all. Notwithstanding the extreme heat, the change of diet and water, not a single case of dysentery was reported at the hospital, and only two cases of temperature, one the result of a chill and one the result of a protracted spree, commenced before the camp started. There was one death, cook William Kanold, Company B, but this cannot be charged to the camp, as the unfortunate man would have probably died at home under similar conditions. By my direction, Maj. Chapman made arrangements for the shipment of the body to Henderson, Ky., and one officer and six men of Company B. accompanied the remains home and remained for the funeral (one day).

Subsistence.

The subsistence as purchased by Maj. Chapman and issued by Lt. Southworth, acting Regimental Commissary, was ample and of the best quality. I visited the kitchens frequently and inquired of the Company Commanders, Quartermaster Sergeants and cooks as to the quality of the issue and in every instance the answer would come "We have a plenty of everything and the men are satisfied." I did not have a single complaint as to the issue during the tour. The issue was closely supervised and waste reduced to the minimum. I

think there will be a saving of several hundred dollars on the authorized allowance which is to the credit of the Subsistence Department.

Inspection.

The Regiment was inspected in heavy marching order on August 15 by Capt. Geo. E. Houle, 26th Infantry, U. S. A. accompanied by Lt. Col. Moffatt, Inspector General's Department. The equipment was practically complete, and the only criticism was on account of the condition of the rifles, which showed more or less rust and was caused by the heavy dews which came at night and the lack of experience of a number of the men as to the care of the rifles. This condition is easily overcome with experience. Capt. Houle is an officer of much experience and while I do not know what his report will be, he said to me that in all the essentials, the regiment is a good one and the minor details could be easily corrected in one month in the field.

Physical Examinations.

A camp of instruction in itself is a big undertaking and when to it is added rifle practice under the conditions which confronted me, it was practically impossible to comply fully with Par. 7 G. O. No. 14. I did the best I could but only a part of the men were physically examined. The two medical officers worked faithfully on such men as could be sent them. The trouble was, the men could not be spared from the other duties and instruction which could only be had in camp, while it is possible at a less expense to examine them at their home stations later.

Discipline.

This subject can be covered by saying I never saw better. The officials and citizens of Earlington expressed the greatest satisfaction at the conduct of the regiment while on liberty. In no instance was private property disturbed and four officers of the U. S. A. made favorable comments on the orderly and soldierly conduct of the men. It is my policy to give all the liberty possible, consistent with discipline, and I am glad to say privileges were not abused to any extent and little punishment necessary. On the whole, I never saw better conduct or a camp more easily controlled.

Recommendations.

I do not believe it good sanitation to cover the latrines with tents. Flies will light on the tents and the next time the tents are used, it may be for men or the storage of provisions and germs possibly turned loose. It is a better plan to use brush as a screen and if brush is not available, a board screen, five or six feet high will be better still and cost comparatively little. The seats should be boxed up tight and close with drop covers so it is impossible for a fly to come in contact with fetal matter. I would also give it as my opinion that better results could be gotten by having camps of instruction and rifle practice at different times. By having seven days camp of instruction alone, then in October when the weather is better, send the companies one at a time for two days shooting and nothing else. Much better results could be had all around at no greater expense.

Conclusion.

Summing up the ten days work and taking into consideration the many difficulties under which we labored, I feel safe in saying that I never saw more work accomplished than was accomplished by the Third Infantry in a given time. The homeward movement of the troops began at 10 o'clock on the morning of the 18th instant, and by 5 p. m. the same day, all the equipment and impedimenta used by the regiment, was packed and loaded in the cars, and billed to Frankfort, sinks filled, ground policed and Company G. relieved. The last troops to leave were Companies A. and D. I returned on the same train and there was no disorder and the men were perfectly quiet in every respect. We regret His Excellency, the Governor and yourself could not find it convenient to visit the camps. I would like for you to have seen what I consider in many particulars, the most successful camp I have ever known in twenty-seven years connection with the Guard.

REPORT OF COMPILER OF RECORDS

Frankfort, Nov. 27, 1909.

GENERAL P. P. JOHNSTON,

SIR:

I have the honor to report, that the work in the branch of your office of which I have charge since I entered your service in February, 1908 has in the main been directed to the compilation, and publication of the Spanish American war records, the investigation of, and certifying military records, and the preparation of confederate records for publication.

Of the before mentioned, the Spanish American war records have been compiled, and published. On an average about 300 letters per month are received, asking for certificates of military service. These are answered, and certificates furnished when it can be found that military service has been performed. This work takes much time where records of the war of 1812, and the Mexican war are asked for as this office has no alphabetical list of the soldiers who served in said wars. The same occurs when widows of civil war soldiers are unacquainted with the service of their husbands.

Copies of the confederate rolls ready for the printer of the 1st, 2nd, 43rd, 6th, and 9th regiments of infantry have been made; also copies of the rolls of the 1st, 4th, 13th, 14th, cavalry.

Copies of the rolls have been made and furnished to Gen. B. W. Duke and Maj. Wm. J. Davis for correction of the 2d, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, regiments of Morgan's cavalry. Copies of rolls have also been made and furnished to Col. Henry George for correction of the 3rd, 7th, and 8th Kentucky mounted infantry and the 12th cavalry. These served under Forest. I am informed by General Duke and Colonel George that they hope soon to have completed the corrections of the rolls submitted to them.

REPORT OF ACCOUNTANT, SPANISH WAR FUND

Dec. 10, 1909.

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL,
Frankfort, Ky.

SIR:

I have the honor to submit a statement covering the accounting for a certain fund in the hands of the Governor, known as the Spanish War Fund, the same being money which was collected from the United States to pay the members of the Kentucky State Guard who were ordered on active service by the Governor of Kentucky in 1898 in response to a call from the President of the United States for volunteers in the War with Spain.

Under the State law this money was payable from State funds, but was allowed by the federal government in view of the fact that the troops were ordered out in defense of the nation, and covered the period intervening between mobilization and muster into the United States service, and for soldiers who reported for duty and were afterward rejected on physical examination.

The amounts shown as being on deposit on December 10, 1907, were transferred to Governor Willson by his predecessor through the medium of the Adjutant General's Office, all records pertaining to this fund and the disbursement thereof being on file in this office.

I was directed by the Adjutant General to assume the duties of accountant of this fund in July, 1908, and began the task of adjusting a large number of claims that had accumulated during the preceding six months.

Before making any payments I made a careful examination of the records on hand for the purpose of satisfying myself of their condition.

The examination revealed a few minor errors that had been made

by paymasters, a few overpayments and underpayments, but in the main the records were in fair condition.

The former Assistant Adjutant General had failed to sign the pay rolls in a large number of cases where payments had been made, and I called on him for his signature, but he declined on the grounds that he had severed his connection with the office and that it would not be practicable for him to sign the rolls; I thereupon made a notation on the rolls after the names that same had been paid by that officer.

In September of 1908 a large poster containing an alphabetical list of the unpaid soldiers was printed and a copy forwarded to the sheriff of each county in the State requesting that it be posted in or about the court house; this advertisement was the means of reaching a large number of the men or their heirs.

Nine hundred circular letters were written to the persons who were shown on the original muster in rolls as the soldiers' nearest friends; these letters brought many replies, but on account of the lapse of time (ten years) many of the letters were returned "unclaimed."

Of the total number of men remaining unpaid in July 1908 (about eleven hundred), over one half have been paid to date; there remain the names of 502 men on the rolls to whom the sum of \$8,891.42 is due, and it is recommended that a further effort be made at once, by the State, to locate these ex-soldiers or in event of their death, their lawful heir or heirs, by advertising the list with an explanatory notice in the Sunday editions of two of the leading newspapers of this section, preferably the Louisville Courier-Journal and the Cincinnati Enquirer on account of their large circulation on Sunday; the cost of advertising to be defrayed from the surplus that has accrued to the fund from interest.

The chance of locating these persons and liquidating the claims is becoming smaller as time elapses, and it is believed that in justice to these men who served the Nation and State, that the State should make every effort to locate them and pay the claims at the earliest practicable time. Some of the amounts are quite small, as small as \$1.28, and some of the men located have refused to go to the trouble

and expense necessary in executing the papers. It is presumed that the final balance remaining after all persons who can be found, are paid, will revert to the State.

The names of the men remaining unpaid, with the company and regiment in which they were enrolled, and the amount due each is appended.
