

Program (AMP), completed in 2009. Through the AMP modification, the Department of Defense has contracted to upgrade systems in all Kentucky C-130H2.5 aircraft with the systems currently incorporated into newly manufactured Hercules aircraft. This fleet upgrade remains on hold pending evaluation of long-term Air Force requirements.

The SCNS system is a computer-based navigational system, which gives the Kentucky aircraft distinct technological advantages in helping ensure accurate airdrops. The Kentucky aircraft were the first to be delivered to the Air Force with factory-equipped SCNS systems. Other Air Force, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve C-130s have been retrofitted with the systems as well. Once location parameters have been programmed into the system, the system's computers are capable of tracking exact locations, calculating precise timing to target, signaling drop points and measuring ground speed and direction and speed of the wind. The system can even provide aircraft steering in preparation for airdrops.

Aircrew from the 123 AW continue to employ the Joint Precision Airdrop System (JPADS), which utilizes Global Positioning System (GPS) signals to guide high-altitude airdrops of equipment and supplies very accurately to ground troops in combat. Our aircrews continued training on the system for an anticipated AEF deployment. The aircraft are also equipped with defensive systems that can detect the launch of Surface-To-Air Missiles (SAM) and take defensive action through the dispensing of flares and chaff. A recent addition to this Missile Warning System (MWS) is the Large Aircraft Infrared Countermeasure (LAIRCM) that directs laser energy to defeat incoming missiles, very common in the high-threat environments in which the 123 AW conducts missions.

The C-130 Hercules aircraft, first rolled out in 1956, remains in service today in 63 countries around the world. A C-130 delivered today does not differ much in appearance to the first aircraft that rolled off the assembly line. The total cargo volume of 4,500 cubic feet, capacity of 92 troops (64 paratroopers) and 74 litters, with two attendants has remained standard. The present production version is a vastly improved, significantly more capable airplane.

Each step along the way in its development evolution, the C-130 has been improved. The manufacturer retained the basic shape and size and concentrated on new and important improvements to internal systems, power and performance. The C-130H Hercules aircraft that make up the Kentucky Air National Guard fleet represent the culmination of nearly 50 years of refinement to the best tactical airlift airframe the world has known.

### ***FACILITIES:***

The Kentucky Air National Guard base at Louisville International Airport is 15 years old and remains one of our nation's showplaces for ANG units located on metropolitan airports. It has wonderful visibility to the public and to its recruiting base, with excellent sight lines to I-65 in both directions.

One of the newest bases in the country, it was completed in May 1995. The Department of Defense has entered into a 50-year lease (which expires in 2046) with the Louisville Regional Airport Authority for the property. The state-of-the-art facility was designed and built specifically for the unit's airlift mission. The 81-acre site consolidates operational and administrative functions within twelve buildings with almost 384,125 square feet of working area. The facility also features 79,167 square yards of aircraft-related pavements and 98,326 square yards of vehicle-related pavements.

The base is truly a showplace with the completion of the front gate facility, decorative fencing, base landscaping, a Minuteman statute, lighting and building signs. A base fitness center is open in a room that once housed the Base Exchange. The Fuel Cell/Corrosion Control was completed in 1997 and adds much needed aircraft hangar space. The base annex, which originally housed a church and school, has also undergone extensive exterior and interior renovation. A hazardous materials (HAZMAT) "pharmacy" is located in the hangar, allowing the wing to track the location and use of all

hazardous materials on base. The Vehicle Maintenance/POL Operations Composite facility is 100 percent complete and has been in use since 1998. The construction of building # 300 in 1999 for the Aerial Port Squadron and STS Facility adds an additional 41,000 square feet of usable space on base.

A Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility (SCIF) provides specialized communications to federal and military organizations. A 50,900 SF 123d Contingency Response Group construction project proposal is in the design stage, with construction currently set for FY2015. The new facility would be located adjacent to the current wing headquarters building and will house the new Contingency Response Group and incorporate a dining hall addition, security forces addition and services addition. Construction was completed in the spring of 2009 on a 15,000 SF Special Tactics Squadron warehouse with environmental controls.

The base boasts several impressive environmental features. In addition to being tested and found to be environmentally clean, the base has a state-of-the-art drainage system in the hangars and on the aircraft ramp designed to capture any fuel spills for proper disposal.

### ***FLYING OPERATIONS AND DEPLOYMENTS:***

The 123d Airlift Wing is part of the 18th Air Force, with headquarters at Scott Air Force Base, Illinois. The unit is assigned to Air Mobility Command (AMC).

Kentucky Air National Guard aircrews flew 3,702.1 hours on 2,457 sorties during the reporting period. Of these flying hours, 1,906.1 were flown in support of worldwide Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (including 32.9 aeromedical evacuation hours) missions, Air Mobility Command Tactical Airlift Control Center missions and Operation CORONET OAK support missions in Central and South America. The unit continues to emphasize flying safety and has built a solid safety record. The KYANG has flown 79,343.2 hours without a Class A accident.

Personnel were deployed all over the globe, many of them in harm's way, to locations including Southwest Asia, Europe, North Africa, Central and South America, and the Caribbean Islands. Additionally, the Kentucky Air National Guard flew numerous missions in the United States.

Elements of the 123d Airlift Wing's Operations and Maintenance Groups deployed with 150 personnel to Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan, October 2010 through January 2011 for Air Expeditionary Force (AEF) 7/8. While deployed, they completed an unprecedented 100% mission capable rate with over 41,000 passengers and 13,500 tons of cargo delivered, and 3.5 million pounds airdropped in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM. The unit set multiple U.S. Central Command monthly records for airdrops and overall airlift support. Lieutenant Colonel Robert Hamm served as deputy operations commander and Lieutenant Colonel Ronald Whelan as the assistant director of operations for the 774th Expeditionary Airlift Squadron at Bagram Air Field.

The 123d Special Tactics Squadron deployed one-third of its personnel for over 2,500 days in 19 combat and ten combat-support roles to CENTCOM, Southeast Asia, Africa and the Caribbean, conducting over 450 ground combat missions and 10,000 hours of combat search and rescue missions which saved 54 personnel. The 123 STS was recognized for its 2009 performance with the formal award of the Gallant Unit Citation for exceptional performance in overseas contingency operations. In addition, 123 STS personnel mitigated a significant Air Force-wide pararescue career field training deficiency by twice hosting Precision Jumpmaster courses for the Air National Guard and active-duty forces – 38 pararescuemen are now fully qualified with zero mishaps in 560 training jumps.

The 123d Civil Engineer Squadron deployed 43 civil engineers to Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan from February through July 2011 supporting Operation ENDURING FREEDOM, providing leadership for a 200-person Expeditionary Civil Engineer Squadron in the completion of more than 2,000 work orders and over \$300 million in base construction projects. Unit members made critical improvements to Bagram Air Field's 11,000-foot runway and paved 400 acres of ramp and

1,000 acres total; installed a vastly improved solar-powered runway lighting system; installed an F-16 simulator; rebuilt a flooded mail facility; and managed construction of \$200 million passenger terminal, cargo terminal and the first permanent C-130 hangar.

Colonel Greg Nelson, wing commander, deployed to Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar, July-November 2010 as the Deputy Director of Mobility Forces for U.S. Air Forces Central Command. In August he forward deployed to Chaklala Air Base in Islamabad, Pakistan, to operate one of the main air hubs for the flood relief effort due to major flooding in Pakistan, facilitating the ability of the U.S. and Pakistani air forces, along with several government and nongovernment agencies, to work together to provide relief to the devastated areas.

Colonel Neal Mullaney, immediate past 123d Maintenance Group commander, commands the third joint Kentucky Army and Air National Guard Agribusiness Development Team. Colonel Mullaney is the first Air National Guard commander of this team, including 10 Airmen, which deployed to Afghanistan in April. An additional 10 Airmen deployed in support of the second joint Kentucky Army and Air National Guard Agribusiness Development Team, which returned home in early May. The deployments are approximately one year in duration. Colonel Mullaney's team has boosted income for 1,400 Afghan raisin vineyards by 50 percent in less than six months.

Colonel Warren Hurst, commander of the 123d Contingency Response Group, deployed to Hickam AFB, Hawaii as Deputy Director of Mobility Forces (DIRMOBFOR) to run air operations for tsunami/earthquake relief in Japan, overseeing the evacuation of 7,580 personnel to the U.S. in less than 10 days for Operation SAFE PASSAGE/TOMODACHI.

Lieutenant Colonel Matthew Stone, 123d Mission Support Group deputy commander, deployed as deputy commander of the 466th Air Expeditionary Group in Kabul, Afghanistan, maintaining responsibility for oversight of 3,000 Joint Expeditionary Tasked Airmen assigned to 154 Army Tactical Control commanders.

The 123d Operations Group sustained throughout the fiscal year its dedicated support to the U.S. Air Force Air Mobility Command Tactical Airlift Control Center (TACC) with one aircraft and two aircrews to fly worldwide airlift, disaster response, aeromedical and VIP support missions whenever tasked.

The 123d Explosive Ordnance Disposal unit of the 123d Civil Engineer Squadron was fully engaged at home and abroad. Members deployed for combat support operations in Iraq and Afghanistan and assisted Indiana and Kentucky state police bomb squads with proficiency training and IED tactics.

The 123d Contingency Response Group demonstrated the 123d Airlift Wing's Initial Response Hub capabilities during National Level Exercise 2011 (NLE11) when, as part of exercise ULTIMATE CADUCEUS, 40 123d Contingency Response Group Airmen opened and operated an air hub at a civilian airfield in Springfield, Missouri for simulated medical evacuation missions. CRG team members processed 17 aircraft, 80 tons of cargo and 104 passengers/patients while directing interoperability with U.S. Transportation Command, the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Defense Support to Civil Authorities. At the same time, 35 members of the 123d Airlift Wing stood up Kentucky's first Joint Air Operations Center (JAOC) at the Kentucky Air National Guard base in Louisville to manage aviation operations in the Commonwealth during NLE11.

### ***AWARDS AND RECOGNITION:***

The 123d Special Tactics Squadron received the Gallant Unit Citation for exceptional performance in overseas contingency operations during calendar year 2009.

Lieutenant Colonel Dallas Kratzer completed a year-long in residence doctorate-level special research fellowship for Department of Defense. Major Shawn Keller, Director of Personnel, 123d Force Support Squadron, and Major Robert Geary, Headquarters Kentucky Air National Guard,

completed Air Command and Staff College (ACSC) in residence at Maxwell AFB. Major Keller earned the ACSC Spaatz Award for excellence. Major Michael Wood graduated from the U.S. Marine Corps in-residence Command and Staff College in Quantico, VA. Major Danielle Lewis graduated from Squadron Officer School in residence at Maxwell AFB.

Chief Master Sergeant Ray Dawson completed the Chief's Leadership Course, Master Sergeant John Wardrip completed the Senior NOC Academy, and Technical Sergeants Christopher Hamilton, Gregory Howard, Adrien Martin, John Poston, Joshua Wade and Anthony Walker completed the NOC Academy. Staff Sergeants Hillman Blanford and Alicia Williams graduated from the Airman Leadership School.

Lieutenant Colonels Shawn Dawley, Robert Hamm and Robert Holdsworth graduated from the Joint Forces Staff College Advanced Joint Professional Military Education seminar course. Lieutenant Colonel Holdsworth earned the Association of the U.S. Army Award for his paper on land combat in a joint environment, which was published in the January 2011 issue of Joint Forces Quarterly.

Second Lieutenant Nick Reinke earned Distinguished Graduate recognition from the Academy of Military Science at Maxwell AFB.

Airman First Class Patrick Shockley earned Distinguished Graduate recognition from the Operations Intelligence Apprentice Course, 315th Training Squadron, Goodfellow Air Force Base.

Major Carolyn Congleton of the 123d Medical Group was named Air National Guard Public Health Officer of the Year, Major Chris Howell was named Air National Guard Physician Assistant of the Year, and Staff Sergeant Sean Walker was named Air National Guard Biomedical Equipment Repair Non-Commissioned Officer of the Year.

Master Sergeant Cynthia Rogers was named Air National Guard Region IV Retention Office Manager of the Year and Technical Sergeant Anthony Walker was named Air National Guard Region IV Production Recruiter of the Year.

Staff Sergeant Jeff Kinlaw of the 123d Special Tactics Squadron was honored with the Patriot Award from Louisville Armed Forces Committee.

Major Dale Greer earned First Place News Photographer and First Place Picture Story recognition in the annual National Guard Bureau Media Contest.

Technical Sergeant Dale Grupe was selected to serve as head coach of the U.S. Air Force All-Air Force Men's Volleyball Team.

SMSGT John Siebert earned USAF Distinguished Rifleman Badge (only 350 in history of the Air Force)

Distinguished Visitor Support – During FY2011 the 123 AW hosted the Commanding General, U.S. Northern Command (Navy Admiral James “Sandy” Winnefeld); the Chief, National Guard Bureau (ANG General Craig McKinley); and the Commander, Director of the Air National Guard (Lieutenant General Bud Wyatt); and the Commanding General, Air Force Northern Command/1st Air Force (Major General Gary Dean), for installation visits.

***ECONOMIC IMPACT:***

The Kentucky Air National Guard means much more to the Commonwealth than its vital roles in responding to disasters and defending our nation's interests. The KyANG is a major employer and an important consumer within Kentucky. The total KyANG Budget, federal and state combined, for fiscal year 2011 was \$77,631,000. Our 393 full-time Civilian Technicians, State Employees, and Active Guard Reserve (AGR) personnel were paid \$28,040,000 in wages during FY11. Military pay for the traditional "part-time" Guard members was \$21,606,000. The total economic impact on the community, based on the Standard Economic Resource Impact Summary formula exceeds \$194,000,000.

***CIVIC/COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT:***

Individuals and units of the Kentucky Air National Guard continue to be active and concerned members of their communities. The community's awareness and appreciation of the work of the Kentucky Air National Guard is very high.

The wing once again hosted all of the aircraft and crews that flew in the Thunder Over Louisville air show, which is the opening event of the annual Kentucky Derby Festival. Unit members ensured that the event continues to be one of the finest air shows in the nation.

The KyANG honor guard continues to increase their presence in the community by performing in ceremonies, flag raisings, funeral presentations and parades. They coordinate with Honor Guard instructors from Wright Patterson AFB to train additional honor guard members due to the increase of statewide requests to perform ceremonies.

The 123d Medical Group hosted quarterly blood drives for the American Red Cross. Air Guard members continue to donate time and talent to the March of Dimes, the Salvation Army, Crusade for Children, Toys for Tots, the Ronald McDonald House, the Air Force Assistance Fund, the Black Expo, the Military Order of World Wars “Massing of the Colors” Veterans and Memorial Day Celebrations, and traffic and crowd control at the Kentucky Derby. Air Guard volunteers from the 123d Aerial Port Squadron assisted with shelters and crowd control at the Special Olympics "Polar Bear Plunge" in the Ohio River in February. Medical Group members provide medical screening for several hundred potential Kentucky National Guard Youth Challenge cadets, ages 15-19, at Fort Knox as they register for the program in January and July of each year.

The KYANG Family Readiness Program, led by Dave Rooney, continues to provide exceptional support to the families of the KYANG throughout the Commonwealth. During this period they hosted several events. Their annual holiday party for deployed family members was hosted by Governor Steve Beshear and the Adjutant General, complete with a visit from Santa. This event was broadcast via video link to deployed service members in Afghanistan allowing family members and troops to share in the event together. Additionally, Louisville was the host city for the 2011 National Guard Volunteer Conference which trained over 1,300 NG volunteers from around the country on

deployment related referrals. The KYANG family program office was highly instrumental in the conference's success. During the Fall 2010-Spring 2011 AEF rotation, the Family Support office provided outreach services and referral actions to the families of over 200 Airmen Deployed throughout the holiday season. Mr. Rooney's program also includes 10 unpaid volunteers who support military families by providing education, assistance and moral support during both deployment and non-deployment times.

Lieutenant Colonel Matt Stone, Deputy Commander, 123d Mission Support Group, and Lt. Col. Pat Pritchard, Financial Management Officer, 123d Airlift Wing, served as president and vice president for Air, respectively, of the National Guard Association of Kentucky, at the association's annual conference in February 2011 at the Hyatt Hotel in Louisville, Kentucky. Lt. Col. George Imorde was elected vice president for Air for the coming year.

Col. Mitch Perry, Director of Operations, Headquarters Kentucky Air National Guard, continues to hold the position of Jefferson Circuit Court (Louisville) Judge. Col. Perry retired in August 2011.

Colonel Steve Bullard, Commander, 123d Mission Support Group, was elected to a fourth term as president of the Louisville Armed Forces Committee and served for his 18th consecutive year as program and dinner chairman for the Committee and its annual Louisville Armed Forces Dinner, the nation's longest running Armed Forces Dinner (since 1919). The committee hosted Admiral James "Sandy" Winnefeld, Commander, U.S. Northern Command and incoming Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, for its dinner speaker at The Galt House Hotel in Louisville and drew 650 attendees.

#### ***PRINCIPAL COMMANDERS AND STAFF:***

Brigadier General Mark Kraus continues to serve as the Assistant Adjutant General-Air, where he represents the Governor and the Adjutant General of Kentucky as the principal advisor on matters pertaining to the Kentucky Air National Guard. He also serves as Commander, Kentucky Air National Guard. He is responsible to the Adjutant General of Kentucky for the overall management of the flying unit in the state. Gen. Kraus also serves as the A-2, Assistant to the Director of the Air National Guard. In this capacity he serves as an advisor to the Director, Air National Guard on Air National Guard Intelligence issues and acts as a liaison between the Air National Guard and Air Force on matters pertaining to Air National Guard A-2. Gen. Kraus additionally serves as the Assistant to the Commander, Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance Agency (AFISRA).

Brigadier General Mike Dornbush, HQ-KYANG Chief of Staff, continues to serve on the Director Air National Guard's Steering Committee for Strategic Planning Process. He is a member of the ANG Roadmap Summit Team for future development of 21st Century ANG and Co-Chairman for Atlantic-Southeast region of the Strategic Planning Process Goal Team.

Colonel Thomas Gross is the State Air Surgeon, Colonel George Scherzer is the Director of Air Staff (formerly known as the Executive Staff Support Officer [ESSO] to the Adjutant General). Colonel Mitch Perry retired as the Director of Operations in August 2011 and was succeeded by Colonel Robert Macke. Chief Master Sergeant James "Jim" Smith continues to serve in the State Command Chief Master Sergeant position. In addition, General Dornbush serves as the Director of the Joint Staff; General Kraus serves as the Joint Forces Air Component Commander (JFACC) and Colonel Scherzer as the Director of Plans (J5) for Joint Force Headquarters Kentucky.

Colonel Gregory Nelson has commanded the 123d Airlift Wing since 5 October 2008. The vice wing commander is Colonel Steve Bullard, who assumed the role in December 2010 following the retirement of Colonel William Ketterer. Colonel Jeff Peters became the 123d Mission Support Group Commander in December 2010. Colonel Kenneth Dale continues to serve as the 123d Maintenance Group Commander and Colonel Barry Gorter as the 123d Operations Group Commander. Colonel William "Bill" Christmas was promoted in June 2011 and resigned his Medical Group command

position in July 2011, electing reassignment to the Individual Ready Reserve. Colonel Bullard is serving as Interim Medical Group commander. Chief Master Sergeant Curtis Carpenter continues to serve as the wing's Command Chief Master Sergeant. Colonel Tom Curry continues to serve as Chaplain Advisor to the Commander, Air Mobility Command, at Scott Air Force Base, Illinois.

There were 505 Kentucky Air National Guard personnel on deployments during FY2011.
