## INTRODUCTION

During the period covered by this report, the strength of the Kentucky National Guard has increased from 3,139 on 22 December 1947 to a total strength of 4,644 officers and enlisted men, prior to federalization of National Guard units. Kentucky has completed the organization of all the National Guard units, air and ground, allotted to the Commonwealth. Approximately 50% of the total strength of the Kentucky National Guard is now in federal service.

Much aid and assistance has been given this department by the assigning of regular Army officers and enlisted men as instructors in the Kentucky National Guard. All of these officers and enlisted men have been eminently qualified for the duties assigned them, and the spirit of cooperation and mutual interest have resulted in one mission—the building of an effective National Guard for use both within the Commonwealth and for federal duty when an emergency arises.

Practically every officer in the National Guard, above the grade of a lieutenant, has had actual battlefield experience in commanding men. Many of the senior non-commissioned officers likewise have had battlefield experience. These officers and enlisted men have given freely of their time and energy beyond the normal call of duty to build a National Guard second to none in the Nation. It is to be remembered that these officers and enlisted men are imbued with the ideals of service to their country inasmuch as each of them came into the National Guard on a purely voluntary basis.

Armories and facilities have been increased by 19 buildings during this period of time. All except six of these have been constructed entirely from federal funds and became the property of the State upon their completion. The remaining six were built from Armory Corporation funds. The Division of the Adjutant General has been presented an increasingly heavy load because of the international situation, the increased number of personnel within the Guard, the added units activated, and the increased administrative procedure established by the Department of the Army. In spite of this increased load, the office, because of budgetary limitations, has employed only one additional person.

The responsibility of the Division of the National Guard, as indicated above, has immeasurably increased because of the imposition of added National Guard Personnel and new forms and records required by National

Guard Bureau and the heavy load of maintenance of records of former National Guard and all other military personnel entering service from Kentucky since the War of 1812. The average turnover of the National Guard in Kentucky has been about 30% annually. This in itself poses a considerable record-keeping operation.

The Division of Armories is now headed by a graduate engineer for the first time in the history of the Commonwealth. With approximately four million dollars worth of armories, this position is of great value to this department and to Kentucky in the saving which has resulted from the proper care and maintenance of armories. As a result of this position being filled by a technically trained officer, federal funds in the amount of \$693,719.38 have come into Kentucky for construction only. It is believed that without the service of this officer much of this federal money would not have come into the State for construction purposes.

On 14 December 1950, the Division of Civil Defense was created by Executive Order of Governor Wetherby. Appropriations from the Governor's Emergency Fund for administrative cost of operation have been allotted for this purpose. An assistant director of Civil Defense and his secretary have been employed. All existing agencies of State government have been allotted a specific duty to perform in Civil Defense commensurate with their normal occupational duties. Excellent cooperation has existed in planning and training within every agency of government. All major cities in Kentucky and a high percentage of smaller cities and towns have Civil Defense organizations. The Air Force of the United States being charged with air defense, has sent into Kentucky six officers and 20 airmen to work with this division in establishing ground observer corps and air raid warning systems. This organization now numbers 600 voluntary workers, and is organized in 235 communities throughout Kentucky. Two filter centers have been established, one at Louisville and the other at Lexington, for the reception and dissemination of information relating to aircraft movements. A goal of 9,000 voluntary workers is desired in the full culmination of this program. The Director of Civil Defense, the assistant director, and certain selected specialists have appeared before groups, clubs, and organizations in practically every section of Kentucky to give information and guidance in the overall establishment of the Civil Defense organization.

The Division of Non-Elective Peace Officers was placed under this department by Executive Order in 1936, and has remained here during the intervening time. At the present time there are 220 special local police officers commissioned under KRS 61.360. The administrative burden of conducting this program is very exacting and very considerable in its

extent. One full-time employee and two part-time employees in this office are required to administer this division. This department is now required to absorb this program without any budgetary support. The fee of \$5.00 for a commission during a four-year period will in no manner or means compensate for the printing, supplies, and postage required to handle each officer. The Adjutant General would most earnestly recommend that sufficient funds be provided for the appointment of a director of this division and at least one clerk, if this division is to remain under the Adjutant General's office, and that an increase in the fee for granting a commission be increased in a sufficient amount to pay the actual cost of printing, supplies, and postage. This recommendation is made because of the fact that the service rendered by these non-elective peace officers is a convenience to the employers rather than the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

The Division of Selective Service by law is placed under the Department of Military Affairs. While this program is administered by a Director of Selective Service, this director and his staff are members of the Kentucky National Guard. Therefore, a certain amount of the administrative handling of this office devolves upon the Adjutant General.



## I. POLICIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY AND AIR FORCE

The Army National Guard is an integral part of the Army, and the Air National Guard is a part of the Department of the Air Force. Therefore, both organizations are subject to certain Army and Air Force policies. The authority for these policies is set forth in the Constitution and the National Defense Act and they are administered through the National Guard Bureau.

The Department of the Army and the Air Force allots units to the State on approval of the Governor, uniforms, equips, prescribes training standards, and pays troops for attendance at drill, field training, schools, and other types of military training.

On the other hand, it is the duty of the State to furnish armories, storage facilities, and organize and train individuals and units of the National Guard.

During time of peace, the Governor has full power to call the Guard to duty in the service of the State. During an emergency, the Congress may empower the President to call any or all the National Guard to Federal service.

The National Guard is in fact the military force for the dual purpose of serving the State in time of peace and being ready to serve the Nation in time of emergency.

## II. DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AFFAIRS

### *Office of the Adjutant General*

The office of the Adjutant General is divided into divisions and sections according to the function each performs. The office is divided into the following six divisions:

- (1) Division of Adjutant General
- (2) Division of National Guard
- (3) Division of Armories
- (4) Division of Civil Defense
- (5) Division of Non-elective Peace Officers
- (6) Selective Service

All divisions except that of the Adjutant General are being covered elsewhere in this report.

The primary function of the Division of the Adjutant General is to maintain accurate records on the active military personnel of the National Guard; keep records of military personnel of all past wars involving Kentuckians; administer all budget and fiscal matters for the department; process all correspondence for the department and handle all publications and blank forms for the National Guard.

The number of personnel employed by the office of the Adjutant General varies from time to time, and on 9 December 1947 eight persons were employed by the office. Of this number six worked in the office proper and two were engaged in supply and housekeeping functions of the National Guard and Active Militia.

During the General Assembly of 1950 Section 36.030, Kentucky Revised Statutes was amended, without a dissenting vote, to raise the rank of the Adjutant General of Kentucky from brigadier general to major general. On 15 June 1950 Governor Clements issued an Executive Order appointing Brigadier General Roscoe L. Murray to the rank of major general effective the same day. For the first time in the history of the Commonwealth the Adjutant General was granted the rank of major general.

As of 30 June 1951 the following individuals were employed by the Department of Military Affairs and paid wholly or in part from State funds:

## OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES PROPERTY AND DISBURSING OFFICER FOR KENTUCKY

The Office of the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer for Kentucky is located at Bowman Field, Louisville, Kentucky. This office prepares requisitions on appropriate Army and Air Force Depots for all authorized items which are required to supply and equip each Federally Recognized Unit of the Kentucky National Guard. It receives, stores and issues this property to the individual units; evacuates unserviceable equipment which is beyond the capabilities of the Combined Field Maintenance Shops, to repair, and ships it to designated Depots of the regular military establishments for overhaul and return to service. The office maintains a Stock Record Account covering each and every item of Federally owned property issued to the State; also, prepares and maintains Memorandum Receipt Accounts, with supporting Vouchers, for each National Guard Unit within the State. Total Federal property issued to the State since World War II is valued at approximately ten million dollars.

The U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer issues all Government Transportation Requests and Bills of Lading; for the movement of National Guard personnel and equipment for Field Training; personnel attending service schools, and shipment of property to Army and Air Force Depots. This officer acts as Purchasing and Contracting Officer in all matters pertaining to construction of permanent buildings, rifle ranges, armory strong rooms and other structures built from Federal funds, either on contract or by purchase and hire; also acts as Fiscal Officer in checking and certifying to all pay rolls and other Vouchers of all types on which payment is made from National Guard funds allotted to the State; maintains fiscal ledgers and Vouchers files to account for all funds so allotted, showing purpose of supplies or services for which these funds are expended.

There are one hundred and thirty-two full time civilian employees, currently employed, and paid entirely from Federal funds. Twenty-seven of these employees are in the Office of the U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer (including clerical personnel for the Field Maintenance Shops); twenty-eight mechanics in the Combined Field Maintenance Shop and Service Centers; thirty-three Administrative Assistants at unit level, five above unit level; thirty-four unit Material Caretakers, and five Air Technicians. National Guard Air units which were ordered into Active Federal Service during October, 1950, were employing sixty-nine full time clerks, administrative personnel and air technicians. Army units ordered to Federal Service during Fiscal Year 1951, also employed forty-six full time persons which are not included in the list of current employees, whose names follow.

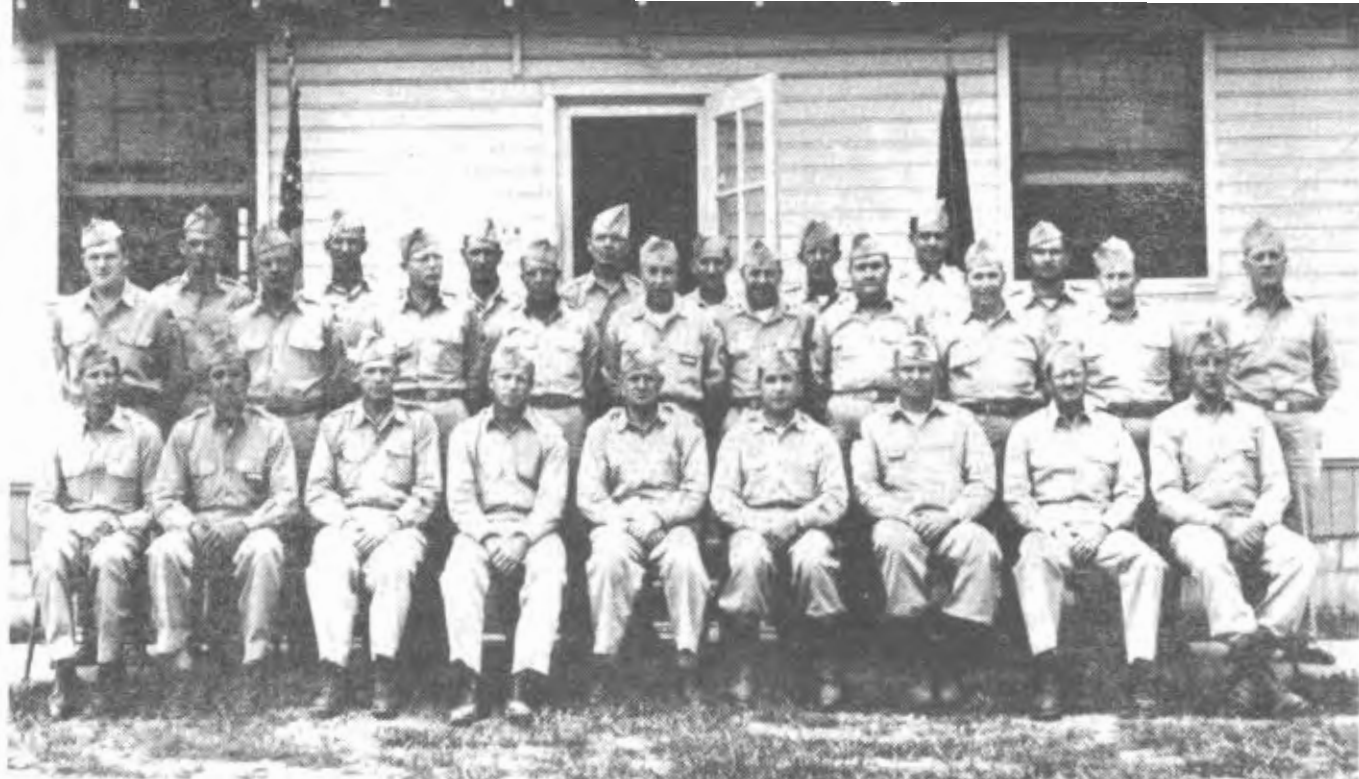

## REGULAR ARMY AND AIR FORCE INSTRUCTORS

*Army:* The Regular Army Instructor support for Kentucky at the beginning of this period, 9 December 1947, was far below strength in officers, consisting of one (1) lieutenant colonel, Field Artillery; one (1) captain, Infantry, and one (1) warrant officer.

From this beginning the officer strength has increased rapidly up to full strength of one colonel, Senior Army Instructor; one lieutenant colonel for the regimental combat team; one lieutenant colonel for the Artillery group; one major or captain for each battalion and assistants to the Senior Army Instructor for Ordnance and Air sections. In general, this support has been constant through the period of this report although there have been many changes in personnel.

The noncommissioned officer support has been sufficient for all spaces throughout the entire period. There have been very few changes in the noncommissioned personnel.

*Air Force:* The Department of the Air Force provided the Kentucky Air National Guard with sufficient, well trained Air Force Instructors. The aid and assistance of these well trained officers and airmen was of great value in organizing and training the Kentucky Air National Guard.

When the Air units were ordered into active Federal service on 10 October 1950 the instructor personnel were assigned with the units until the Air units were able to operate efficiently as a part of the active Air Force.

### III. KENTUCKY NATIONAL GUARD

#### ORGANIZATION AND REORGANIZATION

##### *Army Units*

On 13 May 1946, the Governor of Kentucky committed the Commonwealth to the organization or reorganization of the following National Guard units of the Ground Forces within the Commonwealth:—

The ultimate aggregate strength of these units amounted to 7,534. It has been the generally accepted concept that an aggregate strength of 2,500 was the strength required by the Commonwealth for its own security forces. The increase over its own needs was accepted by the State as its share toward the needs of the Nation. It was understood that for the Commonwealth to organize such a force, Federal assistance would be required in the field of armory construction and personnel support through UMT or similar legislation.

Subsequent to 13 May 1946 the following units allotted and accepted

The organization and Federal recognition of Company C, 201st Engineer Combat Battalion at Owensboro completed the organization of all Army units allotted to the Commonwealth.

The aggregate strength of all Army National Guard units then organized on 9 December 1947 was 2,873 officers and men.

The aggregate strength of all Army National Guard units organized and remaining under state control was on 30 June 1951: 1,967. (See figure 4 showing aggregate strength of National Guard by quarters from 31 March 1947 to 30 June 1951.)

## AIR UNITS

For the first time since the beginning of the National Guard, air units were allotted to the State. The following units were allotted and accepted by the Governor in 1946 and were Federally recognized on the day indicated.

Due to the availability of training facilities and qualified personnel, all units were organized at Standiford Field, Louisville, Kentucky. Hangars, shops, storage, and office space were provided by the Federal Government on land belonging to Louisville and Jefferson County Air Board. A service contract was prepared whereby the Federal Government would pay for 75% of the cost of utilities and other service charges and the State would pay 25% of such charges.

These organizations were equipped with F-51 type airplanes, as well as two C-47 cargo airplanes and a few advance trainers. All pilots were experienced in aerial warfare in World War II and almost all the key airmen were trained during the past war. These men went to work with enthusiasm and by early 1948 the units were well organized and fast reaching a high peak of efficiency.

The problem of manpower was never a serious one and the units had little difficulty in maintaining adequate strength in both pilots and ground personnel.

The National Guard Bureau authorized the State to employ full-time personnel from members of the Air National Guard for the purpose of maintaining the airplanes, weapons, and equipment, and performing the necessary administrative duties. All these employees were paid wholly from Federal funds.

## PERSONNEL

Personnel in the Kentucky National Guard come from all walks of life and all professions. They are citizens who devote part of their time each week to the National Guard and who are ready to devote full time in time of a national emergency. National Guard units are usually located in communities where potential guardsmen reside. In the early days of the post-war National Guard, from 1946 to 1947, a high percentage of National Guard personnel was veterans with active war-time combat experience. During 1948 and up to the present, most enlisted men of the National Guard had no military experience. Almost one hundred percent of the officers and a large majority of the non-commissioned officers are men with previous military experience. Using this trained cadre as a nucleus it was possible to train new men in building an effective National Guard in the shortest possible time. The original troop allotment for the State called for 7,534 officers and enlisted men in the Army units and 615 in the Air units. This strength goal was never reached. In the first place, the troop allotment was based upon the planning that universal military training would be enacted into law and that personnel called to serve in the program be returned to the reserve components to finish serving their obligated time. The program failed to materialize. The enactment of the Selective Service Act of 1948 has some effect upon the Kentucky National Guard, and coupled with the international situation, resulted in the State reaching a peak strength of 420 officers, 17 warrant officers and 4,207 enlisted men in both the Army and Air units during December 1949. Through the past four years the strength of the National Guard has fluctuated, depending on many factors. It was found that units organized in small towns were better supported by the townspeople in maintaining the strength of the units. Leadership in the unit, however, is believed to be the important factor in maintaining adequate strength.

Aside from maintaining adequate strength the problem of drill attendance is an ever present problem facing unit commanders. A guardsman who does not attend drill is of little value to the unit. In most cases it is necessary to excuse some men from each assembly due to conflicting work schedules, temporary absence from the State or community and for other good and sufficient reasons. The National Guard is very strict about drill attendance and each commander is encouraged to deal with absentees as he sees fit under the law and regulations. Each guardsman is authorized to attend 48 drills and two weeks field training duty each year. For each drill attended he is paid one full day's pay. Drill attendance has steadily increased during the past four years. One of the outstanding contributing factors to the increase in drill attendance has been the development of an

interesting and constructive training schedule. Likewise the attendance at field training has increased each year. During the year of 1950 ninety percent of the officers and eighty-four percent of the enlisted men attended field training.

Due to the very nature of the National Guard there is a large turnover of personnel. Each year approximately thirty percent of all enlisted men are discharged and new men come in to take their places. (See figure 5). More discharges are granted for incompatible occupation and change of residence than for any other reasons. During the past four years a total of 228 officers and 6,463 enlisted men were discharged from the Kentucky National Guard.

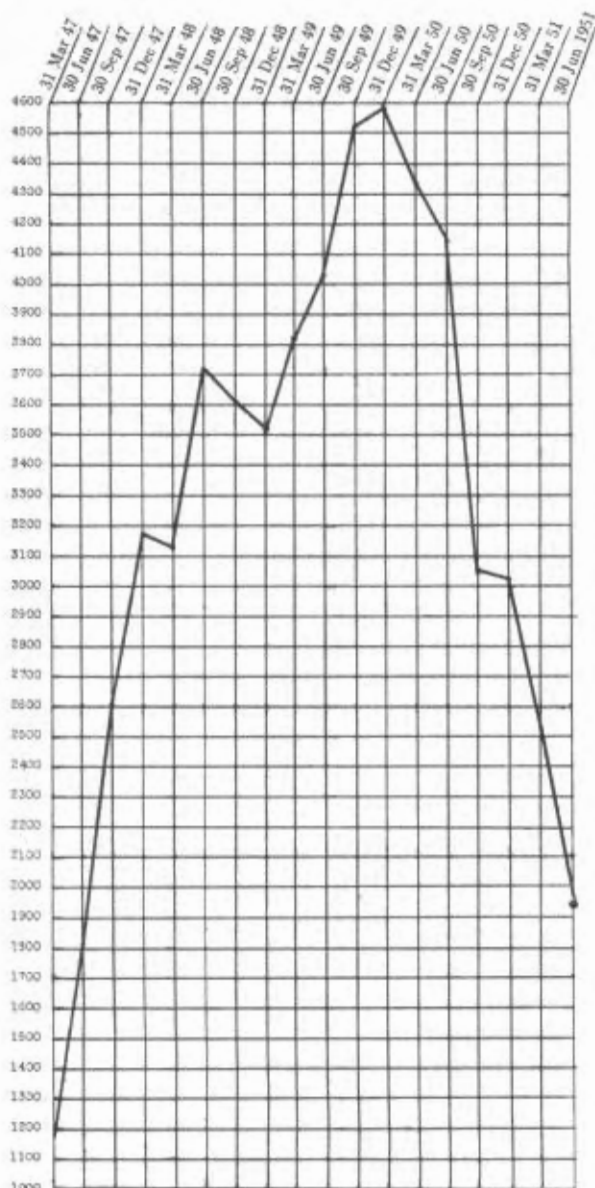

## TRAINING

### Armory Training

In the fall of 1948 the Army Field Forces and the National Guard Bureau revised the armory training program. The new program provided a division of the two hour training period into two one-hour periods, the first being devoted to general subjects for the entire unit, the second hour devoted to concurrent training of first, second and third year men. The plan provided for training on a three year cycle. The unit training program and subject schedules were modified to conform to the plan. This new training program has proven most successful. The training has progressed uniformly throughout the units and in uniformity with other states. This plan provides training commensurate with the previous training and experience of each member of the unit.

In December of 1948 the National Guard Bureau authorized 2 days of extra drill for small arms firing for the calendar year of 1949. These extra drills provided a week end of training. This type of instruction was repeated in 1950. In 1951 these additional instruction periods were increased to 12 for the fiscal year and the scope of training was increased to include unit instruction in subjects not suitable for the short period of weekly drills in armories. These additional days of instruction made week end training profitable and permitted units to complete small arms firing instruction and similar training that had previously used up a large portion of summer training that should be devoted to tactics and training with other units.

### Field Training

The Separate Detachment of the Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment (Selective Service Section) trained at Louisville, Kentucky.

Profiting from the experience gained from the previous year and with more units organized, the Guard conducted a most profitable camp. Schedules were better, armory training began to show its effect and all officers evidenced a more thorough understanding of their problems. The Headquarters Detachment was reorganized and was able to perform its proper functions, taking much of the administrative burden from the line organizations. A particularly commendable feature of this year's training was the intense interest and high spirit shown by all personnel of the command.

All facilities at Fort Knox were made available to the National Guard and all personnel from the Commanding General down did everything possible to make the training successful. This spirit and interest did much to break down the friction that had existed in past years.

One unit, the 441st Field Artillery Battalion attained a rating of superior and all other units were rated excellent. (See Figure 6 for ratings by Inspecting Officer.) (Note that for the year 1948 ratings are given for major units and separate units only).

The Separate Detachment (Selective Service Section) attended camp at Louisville, Kentucky.

The National Guard had completed the organization of its Infantry and Artillery units with sufficient service units to support itself during Summer Camp. The service and support units were combined into a provisional battalion for training and administrative supervision. Training was held to the first year (NGTP) level directing training to the operation of section and platoon.

The inspecting team from the Regular Army was composed of members in sufficient number and with appropriate training to give a most thorough inspection of each unit each day, formerly one or two inspections covered all units. These observations were summarized daily. The Chief

of the Inspection Team conferred with the Adjutant General and the Senior Army Instructor daily thereby bringing out errors or deficiencies in time to correct them during camp.

All units of the command achieved an excellent rating, the highest rating authorized on the inspection form (Form 7, NGB). One battalion of the 149th RCT, the 441st Field Artillery Battalion was rated Superior and the form changed accordingly. (See Figure 6 for ratings.)

On the recommendation of the Commanding General, Second Army, officers of the Reserve were allotted to the Guard for training. 28 of these officers made applications and were accepted and used where appropriate positions were found. A large number of them were used in the State Staff where they were of material assistance.

As in previous years the troops were organized into three major commands. The Infantry Regimental Combat Team, the Field Artillery Group, and the Provisional Battalion containing all of the units not in the Infantry Combat Team and Field Artillery Group.

The inspection by the Regular Army Inspecting Team followed the same procedure for the previous year (1949) with the exception that units



down to include company and battery size units were given an efficiency rating. All units were rated excellent with the exception of six units rated satisfactory. (See Figure 6 for rating of units).

During this period the units trained at the second year training level. Their training emphasized the operation of the company and battery.

The officers of the Reserve were with us during this training period. They were of great assistance in staff positions.

During this year emphasis was placed on bivouac and field maneuver. The men reacted well to the more rugged type of training.

Governor's Day was changed from the second Friday to the first Saturday of camp thereby saving considerable time for field training.

## AIR UNITS

All Air National Guard units attended field training exercises at the locations and on the dates indicated below:

During these training exercises the units of the Kentucky Air National Guard trained with other units from Ohio and West Virginia. The headquarters for the 55th Fighter Wing was located in Ohio and units of that wing were stationed in all three of the states. By ordering all the units of the wing to field training at the same base and at the same time the wing could train as one tactical organization.

These field training exercises were of unestimable value to the air units, and the Kentucky units received a very high rating of efficiency by the Air Force.

During the three field training periods the Kentucky Air National Guard set an outstanding safety record by not losing a single pilot or crew member in an aircraft accident. Not a single major accident occurred during the many hours of training flown.

Many officers have taken correspondence courses to improve their military education, and remove waivers in the case of officers now serving in branches other than their war time service. Enlisted men have taken the 10-series correspondence course to qualify for commission. This source of officers has been most fortunate. It has been found that officers who come into the Guard from the Guard ranks are stable, and in time well qualified.

## OTHER TRAINING

In October 1949 the National Guard Bureau authorized Staff training for the Infantry, Artillery and Engineer staff at battalion and regimental and group level. The National Guard Bureau and the Army Field Forces Headquarters completed a thorough course with appropriate lectures, problems, aids and lesson plans for these courses. On or about 30 July 1949 arrangements were made with the Artillery School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma for a week end refresher course for officers of the 138th Field Artillery Group. The National Guard Air Force transported these men to and from this course. Fourteen (14) officers and six (6) instructors attended the session.

On 15 - 20 May 1949 a school was held at St. Matthews, Louisville, Kentucky for the newly authorized Company, Battalion, Combat Team and Group Administrative Assistants.

On 26 and 27 January 1950 a conference was held at Frankfort, Kentucky for all instructors and selected Kentucky administrative personnel on surveys, morning reports and forms 68. On 4 May 1950 a similar conference was held on preparation of NGB Form 115.

On 23 and 24 May 1951 a school for Caretakers was held at Bowman Field, Louisville, Kentucky, on care and maintenance of signal equipment. Lexington Signal Depot, Lexington, Kentucky furnished instructors and demonstrations for this school.

On 9 and 10 June 1951 all Administrative Assistants, Caretakers, Key Company, Battery and Battalion personnel and instructors were assembled at St. Matthews, Kentucky for a school in induction procedures.

## TROPHIES

*Adjutant General's Trophy.* The Adjutant General, Major General Roscoe L. Murray, established an Adjutant General's Trophy and donated a cup to be contested for each year. This trophy was to be awarded to the unit in the Kentucky National Guard (Army) attaining the highest degree of proficiency in Armory and Field Training. It was to be awarded each year at the Governor's Day Parade during Summer Field Training.

Winners during the period of this report were as follows:

August 1948 to August 1949: Tank Company, (Medium), 149th Inf RCT, Hopkinsville, Kentucky, commanded by Captain Elliott R. Miles.

August 1949 to August 1950: Battery C, 198th Field Artillery Bn., Elizabethtown, Kentucky, commanded by 1st Lieut. James T. Wortham.

*Eisenhower Trophy.* The National Guard Bureau established the Eisenhower Trophy and provided for a cup and replica for the winner. Principal cup to be contested for annually and replica to go to the winning unit for permanent possession. This cup was to be awarded on basis of general excellency in Armory and Field training and maintenance of strength throughout the year.

This cup was won by the Service Battery, 623rd Field Artillery Battalion, Springfield, Kentucky, commanded by Captain Edward H. Milburn, for the calendar year 1949.

*National Guard of Kentucky Trophy.* The National Guard Bureau by Section II, National Guard Regulations No. 44, established a trophy for Merit in marksmanship for the 1950-1951 season.

This trophy was to be awarded to the unit of company size attaining the highest proficiency in firing the M-1 rifle or carbine during the regular firing season.

The trophy had not been awarded by the close of this report.

*Spatz Trophy.* The National Guard Bureau by NGB Circular No. 30, dated 8 December 1948 authorized the Spatz Trophy to be awarded at the annual field training exercise to the most outstanding flying unit of each Air National Guard Wing.

This trophy was won by the 165th Fighter Squadron, 123d Fighter Group of the 55th Fighter Wing for the calendar year 1949. Units of this wing from Ohio, West Virginia and Kentucky were competing for this trophy. The 165th Fighter Squadron was stationed at Standiford Field, Louisville, Kentucky and commanded by Major Albert W. Clements.

Due to the fact that all units of the Kentucky Air National Guard were in Federal Service during the annual field training dates for 1951, the trophy was not awarded for the calendar year of 1950.

## INSPECTIONS

In addition to the formal Armory and Field inspections discussed elsewhere in this report, the Second Army has conducted various technical inspections as follows:

*Ordnance Inspections* in 1948, 1949 and 1950. These inspections were made by teams from the Second Army. They were made with the assistance of the Maintenance Officer. Because of their thoroughness and attention to detail they were of great instructional value. (For results of these inspections see Figure 7.)

*Quartermaster Inspections* — During 1950 the Quartermaster Section of the Second Army sent Major J. N. Lorie to inspect Quartermaster property. This was one of the most thorough and informative inspections that the Commonwealth had ever received. It was painstaking, thorough and instructive. Ratings are as shown in Figure 7. In 1951 the Quartermaster property was given a spot inspection by the Second Army.

All of these technical inspections have been of benefit to the National Guard as a whole. The inspectors reported to the Adjutant General before and after the inspections. On the visit prior to the inspection the Adjutant General was able to give the inspectors information on special problems and point out particular points that he wanted covered. After the inspection the inspector was able to give most helpful information and advice on the maintenance of the property involved. This mutual understanding and cooperation has materially improved the property discipline in the Kentucky National Guard.

## EQUIPMENT

*Maintenance:* All military equipment issued to and used by the Kentucky National Guard is on a loan basis from the Federal Government. The preparation for issue, maintenance and storage of this equipment is a major problem for the National Guard.

The State Adjutant General representing the State is responsible for the proper utilization, care and maintenance of Federal equipment issued to the Kentucky National Guard and supervised by the Federal Government.

The State Maintenance Officer operates under the Adjutant General and is responsible to him for the preparation of plans and policies and directs all activities concerning the maintenance and repair of Federal property issued to the state for use by the National Guard, including the Light Aviation Section.

Personnel to operate the maintenance program are paid from Federal funds. A total of sixty-five (65) persons are employed at present to implement the maintenance program.

During the years 1947, 1948 and 1950 the National Guard of Kentucky received 487 vehicles which were in very poor condition due to having been used during World War II and from being stored in the open for a long period of time. To process these vehicles to meet the Army standards before issue, required one hundred and sixty (160) man hours per vehicle. A major part of other equipment received required processing before being issued.

Maintenance of equipment starts with unit or user maintenance. Each individual using a piece of equipment is required to perform maintenance and repairs of equipment with the tools and knowledge that he possesses. Organizational maintenance that cannot be performed by the individual user is performed by the Unit Material Caretaker. Maintenance above the organizational level is called field maintenance and is performed by the Combined Field State Maintenance Shop. Equipment requiring field maintenance is forwarded to the Combined Field Maintenance Shop accompanied by WD AGO Form 811 (Work Request and Job Order.) When repairs are completed the unit is notified by letter. Equipment requiring maintenance above Field Maintenance level (4th echelon) is forwarded by the State Maintenance Officer to Fort Knox, Kentucky, the authorized Army support for the Kentucky National Guard, where maintenance is performed and repairs accomplished at no cost to the state.

*Combined Field Maintenance Shop:* The Combined Field Maintenance Shop was established at Bowman Field,

Louisville, Kentucky for the repair of equipment of all technical services, such as vehicles, tanks, artillery, small arms, radios, fire control instruments, canvas and other miscellaneous equipment. Personnel of this shop accounts for twenty-three (23) of the personnel mentioned above.

*Light Aviation Section:* A Light Aviation Section, a component part of the Combined Field Maintenance Shop is located at Bowman Field, Louisville, Kentucky. This Section provides maintenance and storage for eight (8) liaison airplanes assigned to the Kentucky National Guard and accounts for five (5) of the personnel mentioned above.

*Service Centers:* A Service Center is a sub-shop of the Combined Field Maintenance Shop of which the main purpose is to provide a centrally located shop properly supervised and equipped with tools, equipment, spare parts, and supplies where the unit personnel may take unit equipment (except airplane equipment) and perform organizational preventive maintenance under the supervision of a trained mechanic. Three (3) Service Centers have been established at the following locations: Bowman Field, Louisville, Kentucky, Lexington, Kentucky and Owensboro, Kentucky. These Service Centers account for three (3) of the personnel mentioned above.

*Contact Team:* The Contact Team is a team from the Combined Field Maintenance Shop composed of an Auto and Tank Mechanic, Fire Control Instrument Repairman, Small Arms Mechanic, Artillery Mechanic, and Radio Repairman. The mission of the Contact Team is to inspect and repair in the scope of Field Maintenance all equipment assigned to the units, provide equipment and limited supplies, render technical advice and other assistance as may be required by the units visited in the accomplishment of organizational maintenance.

*Unit Material Caretakers:* Each National Guard Company or Battery has a Unit Material Caretaker, who is a full time employee and is paid by the Federal Government. Unit Caretakers work directly under the supervision of the Unit Commander and are responsible to the Unit Commander (except during Field Training), for the receipt, care, maintenance and repair of all unit equipment. Thirty-four (34) Unit Caretakers are now employed by the Kentucky National Guard and are included in the total of sixty-five (65) maintenance personnel now employed.

*Status of Equipment:* All equipment issued to the Kentucky National Guard now meets the required Army standards.

*Status of Maintenance:* The maintenance to equipment issued to the Kentucky National Guard as shown by inspections performed by Second Army Personnel for the year 1951 is "Excellent."

## COMMONWEALTH DUTY

During the period of this report 9 December 1947 to 30 June 1951, there have been no instances where the Guard has been called into Commonwealth duty for the suppression of riots or disturbances or in support of civil authorities.

On 1 and 2 February 1951 on orders of the Governor 2 officers, 1 warrant officer and 20 enlisted men of Hq & Hq Company, and Medical Platoon, 1st Battalion, 149th Infantry RCT, were called into Commonwealth duty at Barbourville, Kentucky, to assist civil authorities in emergency flood duty at that place.

On numerous occasions units of the Guard have voluntarily, but not on Commonwealth call, assisted local communities in local disasters. Notable among these instances were:

Forest fire near Ashland, Kentucky on or about 21 Nov. 1949.

Flash flood near Barbourville, Kentucky, during winter of 1949.

Units have taken part, on a volunteer basis, in numerous parades and demonstrations.

In May of each year of this report units of the Kentucky National Guard are called individually into Commonwealth duty to act as guards and to take part in the ceremonies incident to the running of the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs in Louisville. This duty is on a voluntary basis. Approximately 600 officers and enlisted men take part. It has been found that this occasion offers an excellent opportunity to train men in assembly, transportation, and the technique of handling large crowds. Furthermore, it has been found that participation in this event is of great value in recruiting for the National Guard.

## FEDERAL DUTY

On 29 July 1950 the 718th Transportation Truck Company was ordered into Federal service for a period of 21 months or such other period as may be authorized by law, effective 19 August 1950. This was the first Army unit of the reorganized National Guard of Kentucky to receive such orders.

On 8 September 1950 all of the Kentucky Air National Guard was ordered into Federal service effective 10 October 1950.

In rapid succession thirty-four (34) company or battery size units and detachments reported for the Federal service until of all such units, as



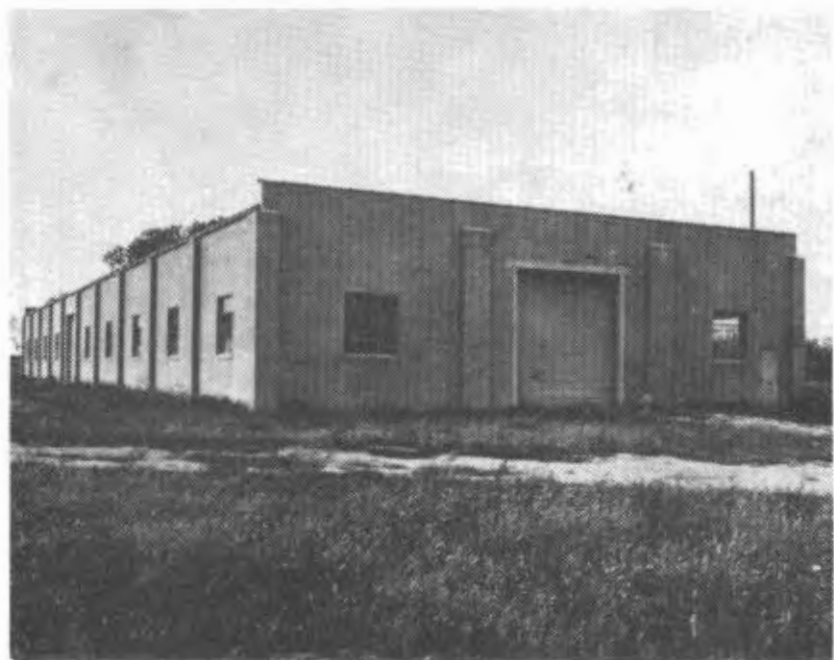
of this date, 47.22% of all units allotted to Kentucky Army and Air National Guard had entered such duty at places and on dates as follows:

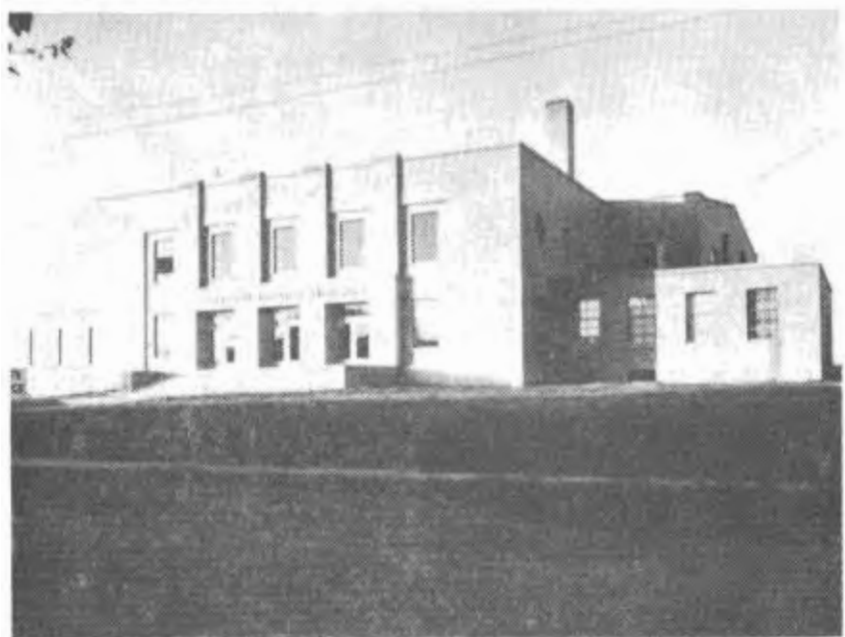

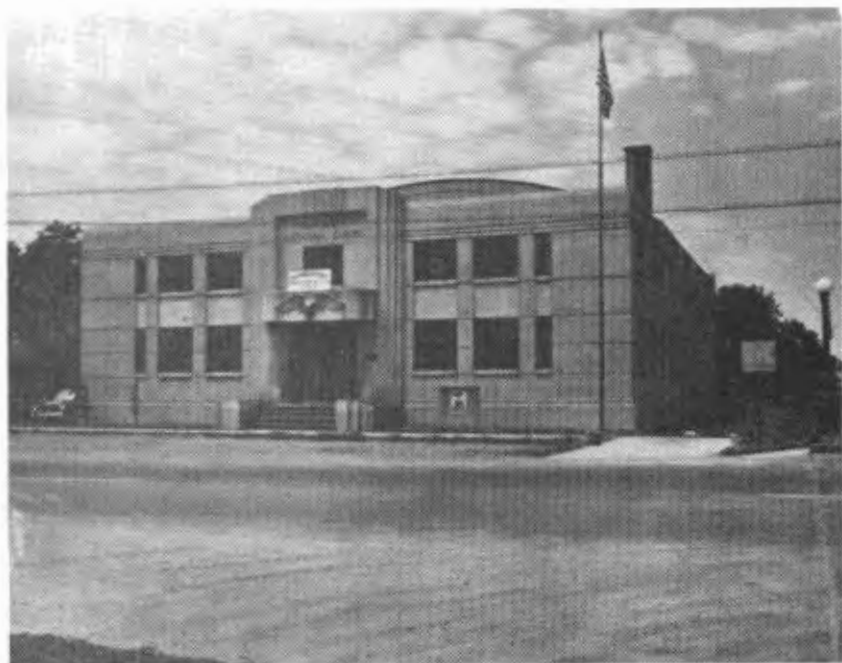

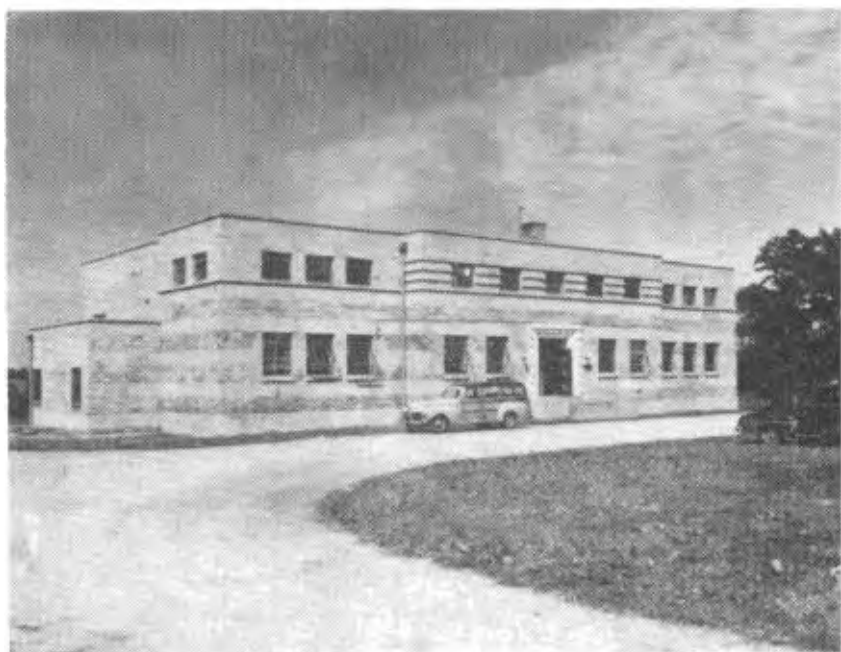

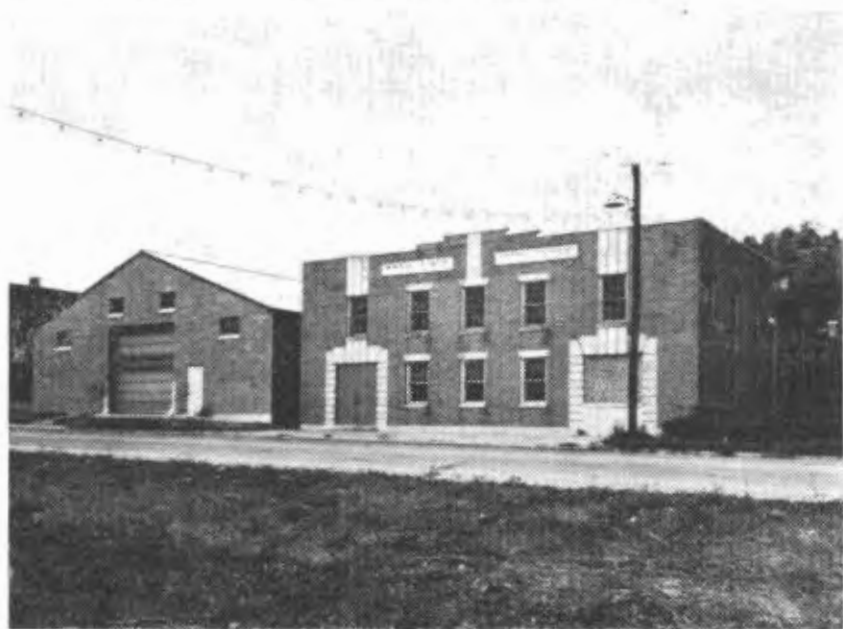

#### IV. FACILITIES

The facilities available to the Adjutant General consist of approximately 4,000 square feet of floor space in the Capitol at Frankfort, together with 57 other items of property located at 37 different sites throughout the Commonwealth. The space in the Capitol is utilized as an office for the ADJUTANT GENERAL and his office personnel and the SENIOR ARMY INSTRUCTOR assigned to duty in Kentucky by the Department of the Army. This space also houses the military records of Kentucky Veterans of the several wars since 1812.

Other properties throughout the state are used as administration and training sites for organizations composing the Kentucky National Guard. The following table indicates the location, usage, ownership, date of construction, and estimated 1951 value of these properties.

## STATE OWNED, RENTED, AND LEASED

The above tabulation, identifies 26 items of property owned by Commonwealth of Kentucky, Military Department. Fifteen armories are owned by Commonwealth of Kentucky Military Department Armory Corporation. Seven items are privately owned, but under lease by the Military Department. Seven properties are privately owned and are occupied by authority of United States Government leases. Two sites are owned by the United States Government and available to the Adjutant General under revokable leases executed in favor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

The properties owned by the Military Department consist of eleven armories, twelve motor storage buildings, one riding hall, one stable, and one airplane hangar. Of the State-owned armories Bowling Green is modern and adequate to meet present needs. The armories located at Bardstown, Glasgow, Hopkinsville, Monticello, Ravenna, and Russellville are not modern but satisfactory minimum requirements are met at present. Armories at Frankfort, London, and Mayfield are entirely inadequate. The Arsenal at Frankfort is usable for office and storage purposes, and has a distinct historical value.

Eleven of the motor vehicle storage buildings are of modern masonry construction. All were constructed from Federal funds and are located on property donated to the state by interested local persons or organizations. The liaison type plane hangar at Glasgow was also constructed from Federal funds at no cost to the Commonwealth.

Of the 15 armories owned by the Armory Corporation, six are new, having been constructed during the past four years. All are of good quality masonry construction. New 20-year bonded roofs were installed on nine of these armories in 1950. All of the Corporation properties are considered adequate.

Seven items of property are leased by the Commonwealth as armories. These items are inadequate for armory purposes, but are, in most cases, the only facilities available. Their use places units of the National Guard under severe disadvantage, but no alternative is apparent until an armory construction program can be developed.

The property available under U. S. lease consists of Outdoor Rifle Ranges at the locations indicated in the tabulation, and storage facilities for airplanes at Blue Grass Air Field, Lexington, Kentucky. All of these facilities are satisfactory.

The United States Government property occupied under revokable leases includes 58 buildings at Bowman Field and the entire installation

known as the Paducah Sub-Depot at Paducah, Kentucky. The property at Bowman Field provides facilities for the Acting United States Property and Disbursing Officer, a detachment of officers and non-commissioned officers under the command of the SENIOR ARMY INSTRUCTOR, the State Maintenance Officer and his staff of technicians and mechanics, the Air Section of State Headquarters Kentucky National Guard, and several units of 138th Field Artillery Group. These facilities are of Department of the Army cantonment-type temporary construction; they are not adequate but do meet the minimum requirements of the using organizations. The Federal Government during 1949 expended approximately \$116,000.00 in renovating this area.

## V. ARMORY CORPORATION

### *Membership and meetings.*

The Commonwealth of Kentucky Military Department Armory Corporation was organized in 1939 as a non-profit organization to issue and sell bonds for the purpose of buying and constructing armories for the use of the Military Department.

There is a board of seven Trustees whose duty it is to carry out the purposes of the Corporation. The Trustees are the Adjutant General of Kentucky, Assistant Adjutant General, Director of Armories, Director of Accounts and control, Department of Finance, a representative of investment bankers, and two to be selected from the Regimental Commanders of the Kentucky National Guard and/or the Kentucky Active Militia.

### *Operations*

The Corporation now makes available to the Military Department fifteen (15) armories located in the following towns: Ashland, Campbellsville, Carlisle, Elizabethtown, Henderson, Harlan, Harrodsburg, Lexington, Madisonville, Owensboro, Richmond, St. Matthews, Somerset, Springfield and Williamsburg.

The Military Department pays an annual rental of \$121,720.00 for the retirement of bonds. The last of these bonds will be retired in 1970 and the armories will then become the property of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

## VI. FINANCES

### *State Appropriations*

The Department of Military Affairs has charge and is responsible to the Governor of Kentucky for the functioning of the Kentucky National Guard or Militia and all other military matters of the State. The Department is composed of the following divisions: Adjutant General, Armories, Ky. National Guard, Industrial Peace Officers, and Civil Defense and Selective Service.

## VII. SELECTIVE SERVICE

Preliminary work toward the organizing of the Selective Service Section of the National Guard State Staff began in 1947, but there was very little progress made in the beginning, due to unforeseen and unpreventable obstacles.

On September 22, 1947, Major General Lewis B. Hershey, director of Selective Service, visited the office of the Selective Service System, Louisville, Kentucky, at which time he voiced assurance that a Selective Service unit would be organized in this state as soon as possible. Commander Chester J. Chastek and Major George J. Wendel, from National Headquarters, Selective Service System, visited the Selective Service Headquarters on October 26, 1947, and the proposed organization of a training unit was discussed in detail. At this time, these two officers also visited the Adjutant General in Frankfort in an effort to obtain a decision and to discuss plans for the formation of a Selective Service Staff and the subsequent establishment of a training program for Selective Service. However, staff organization moved slowly, and Major Wendel again visited the Adjutant General on November 18 in a renewed effort to expedite staff activity with the Selective Service System.

On January 8, 1948, Colonel Solon F. Russell, state director of Office of Selective Service Records, visited the Adjutant General in Frankfort, accompanied by Commander Chester J. Chastek, and discussed in detail staff organization, training programs, etc. This was the first meeting from which any conclusion was reached and definite decisions were made relative to the Selective Service training program for this state. Plans were formulated that Colonel Russell would be appointed State Director of Selective Service State Headquarters and at this time his suggested staff officers were discussed. Colonel Russell, as state director, recommended the following officers for the Selective Service portion of the state staff:

On or about January 26, 1948, Colonel Russell departed for Washington, and instructions were issued that the members of the Selective Service staff should hold an early meeting with Lt. Colonel Robert J. Gibson who was in command in the absence of the commanding officer. The first meet-

ing of the staff officers was held on January 27, 1948, with the following officers in attendance:

Subsequent staff meetings were held, and Major George J. Wendel, who was designated the training officer for Kentucky, attended and discussed in detail the proposed training program for future duties of those Selective Service Staff officers who had been appointed up to this time. The officers with prior Selective Service experience were: the commanding officer, Colonel Solon F. Russell, the deputy state director, Lt. Colonel Robert J. Gibson, Lt. Colonel Sam E. Hicks, and Major William W. Ensminger, Jr.

It was decided at this time by the Selective Service Training Section in National Headquarters for Selective Service that there should be established throughout the Army areas a method of Selective Service conference programs as a means to train selected officers in present and future Selective Service affairs. A conference in the Second Army was arranged to be held at Ft. Meade, Md., April 10 through April 26, 1948. The officers selected to attend this meeting were Colonel Solon F. Russell and Lt. Colonel Sam E. Hicks.

The results of the conference as a whole were considered highly satisfactory in several ways, mainly because it served to acquaint all newcomers with the structure and fundamentals of the Selective Service System and to initiate a training program for all present participants, as well as to lay the groundwork for future schools and programs.

Subsequent and similar conferences were held in 1949 and 1950, but after the 1950 conference period it was decided to have each earmarked Selective Service officer participate in an "on-the-job training program" in a decentralized State Headquarters.

During the first part of the year 1948, the Congress of the United States decided to enact a new Selective Service law which passed both Houses and was signed by the President on June 24, 1948. Such legislation served to stimulate the Selective Service activity in the state, and on August 18, 1948, the state director, Colonel Solon F. Russell, and the chief of the Manpower Division, Major Sam E. Hicks, were called on active duty to establish a new Selective Service Headquarters for Kentucky. This Headquarters was operated in conjunction with the Office of Selective Service Records at 1405 West Broadway, Louisville, Kentucky. The members

of the National Guard staff, which included several enlisted men, assisted in the establishment of the headquarters and the activation of 99 Selective Service local boards throughout the state. Assistance rendered by the following officers and men was considered invaluable:

There were several officers assigned to the staff at this time for administrative purposes only and who do not participate in Selective Service affairs. They were: Lt. Colonel Robert C. Riggs, Captain Samuel L. Andelman, Captain Harry C. Lowman, Captain Vernon Vincent, First Lieutenant George B. Thomson. Later Colonel Samuel Sears was assigned as deputy director at the resignation of Lt. Colonel Robert J. Gibson. Colonel Sears performed no Selective Service duties and the assignment remained only administrative. Colonel Riggs also resigned from the staff and was replaced by Captain Andelman who later became a major.

The portion of the staff performing Selective Service training was called Separate Detachment, Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, NGUS. The detachment continued training through the year 1949 and concentrated entirely upon Selective Service affairs. The summer training period held in August 1949 was the first two weeks' training session to be held which was devoted toward mobilization of manpower at any future date. Training continued throughout the year 1949 and the year 1950 with periodic visits from the field representatives of National Headquarters for Selective Service. The summer training period held in August 1950 was devoted entirely to "on-the-job training" by the officers and enlisted men named below:

It will be noted that Master Sergeant Henry L. Bethel was on duty during this period as a first lieutenant inasmuch as he received his commission in the National Guard of Kentucky on October 26, 1949. He was then called to active duty on September 11, 1950, at which time he was assigned to the Manpower Division, Selective Service Headquarters in Louisville.

## VIII. HISTORICAL RECORDS

The Office of the Adjutant General is custodian of all military records of Kentuckians serving in the National Guard since 1899 and all Kentuckians serving in every war in which the nation has been engaged since the War of 1812. The Civil War records cover both the Union and Confederate armies. Records covering World War II are being received by counties and to date records have been received for men and women entering the service from Adair, Allen, Anderson, Bell, Boone, Bourbon, Bath, Boyd and Breathitt Counties.

Each month the office receives many requests from individuals for statements of service for duty performed with the National Guard or for service during any one of the above wars. These statements of service are of great value to the individual for retirement purposes, longevity pay, old age assistance, grants for burial purposes, writing histories, to trace ancestors and for other reasons. This office prepares approximately 50 statements of service each month and answers many inquiries concerning service of members or past members of the armed forces.

## IX. CIVIL DEFENSE

On December 14, 1950 the Division of Civil Defense was created under the Adjutant General's Department by executive order of Governor Wetherby, who deemed such a step necessary in the light of the tense international situation. An appropriation of \$10,000 was allocated from the Governor's Emergency Fund for this purpose.

Little work had been done in the Commonwealth of Kentucky prior to the above mentioned executive order to arouse and inform the citizens of the dangers of modern warfare against the civilian populace. No organized public education for protection program had been established, nor were any of the key municipalities in Kentucky cognizant of their duties and responsibilities to the citizens.

With an office staff of two full-time employees, plus the necessary time which the Adjutant General, as Director of Civil Defense, could take from his pressing affairs, the office of Civil Defense set about its task as outlined in the Federal pamphlet "United States Civil Defense."

At this writing all major cities in Kentucky have a Director of Civil Defense operating in most instances within the existing governmental machinery. All total fifty seven cities have complied with numerous requests from the state office to appoint a director. Besides acting as a clearing house for all Federal publications relating to Civil Defense the state office has supplemented and screened this mass of information in order that municipal bodies may secure applicable material. Of the fifty seven cities above cited all have received copies of the following pamphlets: "United States Civil Defense," "Health Services and Special Weapons Defense," "Survival Under Atomic Attack," "What You Should Know About Biological Warfare" and "This Is Civil Defense," in addition to numerous information bulletins on special phases of Civil Defense.

The Director and Deputy Director of Civil Defense have made numerous trips to many cities in the Commonwealth at their request to assist in the organizing of local Civil Defense plans, as well as speaking at many functions of municipal and state organizations to promote Civil Defense activity.

The existing Departments of State Government were by the aforementioned executive order requested to alert themselves for use in an emergency for Civil Defense activity. At a call issued by the Adjutant General all departments of state government pledged their cooperation in usage of state personnel, materials and supplies in the event of an emergency. With one or two exceptions the State Office of Civil Defense now has on file an inventory of all machinery, equipment and persons responsible for same so that coordinated use of these items can be effectuated.



At the request of the State Department of Civil Defense the Governor allocated an additional \$1,400 for use by the State Department of Health in a training program within the nursing profession. Medical aspects of the atomic bomb were taught to regional representatives of the nursing profession who in turn are at present engaged in the second echelon of training in the field. Two films which portray in detail the effects of radiation upon the Japanese have been purchased for use in this training program.

The state air raid system includes a telephone now installed in the State Police Office on twenty-four hour watch. Over this phone from the United States Air Force will come Kentucky's first air raid warning signal which will be dispatched to the appropriate city under a previous arrangement with the telephone company.

Other state agencies have cooperated fully in the use of their time and effort for Civil Defense.

In the field of public information the State Office has requested many out of state experts in Civil Defense who have attended public forums and meetings to contribute to the knowledge of State and Local organizations.

On file in the State Office at present are ten prints of the film "Survival Under Atomic Attack." This sound motion picture has been made available to all cities in Kentucky for use at Civil Defense meetings. The general public likewise has been availed of the film for any civic meeting. An organized showing in the schools has been undertaken in some municipalities with complete state plans on this phase under consideration.

More than 150,000 copies of a card called the "Alert Card" will be disseminated to target areas by the state office in the near future in addition to the many thousands which have been printed at local or private expense. This card, which contains for pocket usage four smaller "cut-out" cards, indicates what the individual should do in an air raid under certain circumstances.

In addition the State Office has cooperated with the Federal Government in the dissemination of Radio and Television program designed to educate the general public on the dangers and precautions necessary for an adequate Civil Defense program.

Within a month the State Civil Defense plan will be in print for distribution to all individuals concerned. This plan will be published in two phases. The first will be called the Basic Plan and will in general outline the responsibilities, duties and command of Civil Defense. The second phase will be a series of annexes outlining in detail the actual functioning processes to be organized. These annexes will be prepared by experts in the respective fields of communications, transportation, Welfare, Police, etc.

## X. ACTIVE MILITIA

No units of the Kentucky Active Militia were organized during the period covered by this report. During January 1949 a complete plan for organizing the Active Militia was completed. This plan was formulated on the basis that when all units of the Kentucky National Guard or when the National Guard could no longer serve the State as a sufficient reserve force the Active Militia would be organized to take the place of the National Guard. Even though approximately 50 percent of the Guard is now in Federal service enough units are still in the State service to render the reorganization of the Active Militia unnecessary at this time.

## XI. NON-ELECTIVE PEACE OFFICERS

The following is a recommendation made by the Legislative Research Commission. It explains in detail the administration of this division of the Military Department.

The Governor may appoint special local peace officers for such time as he deems necessary to preserve the peace and to protect the property of any person from waste or destruction under KRS 61.360. Upon the application of a property owner for such police services and after payment of a fee of \$5.00 for each officer to be appointed, the Governor is directed to immediately appoint the person recommended by the owner, if that person is eligible.

In order to be eligible the applicant must meet the requirements of KRS 61.300 which are established for all non-elective peace officers. The duties of such an officer are confined to the premises of the property to be protected, except when in pursuit of a person who has committed an act of violence or destroyed property. Peace officers may wear badges or other insignia but are specifically forbidden by statute to wear any uniform or part thereof of any public peace officer. The law is unmistakably clear in its distinction between these special local peace officers and public peace officers.

The owner of the property is required to pay into the State Treasury an amount equal to the salary of the officer, and the salary of the officer is paid directly out of the State Treasury. Application fees are placed in the State Treasury and credited to a revolving fund for the administrative expenses of the program.

Governor A. B. Chandler by executive order assigned responsibility for the administration of the special local peace officer program to the Adjutant General. An annual appropriation of \$5,000 was made to cover the cost of this function. The program was administered by an administrative employee and a clerical stenographic employee in the Adjutant General's office. Governor Keen Johnson as an economy measure required the Adjutant General to absorb this program in his regular budget without special appropriation.

At present 220 special local peace officers are commissioned under KRS 61.360. The administrative burden of conducting this program is considerable. The Adjutant General must, before appointing such officers, conduct an investigation to assure that the individual is eligible for appointment under the provisions of KRS 61.300. Since special local peace officers are appointed for four-year terms but are bonded annually, an annual investigation is necessary to assure security of bonds. As the agent of the Governor, the Adjutant General also must investigate all charges of misconduct. The processing of payrolls in accordance with KRS 61.360 also presents a problem, especially since a number of employers fail to make all payments of salary to special local peace officers through the State Treasury as directed by this statute.

Close and continuing supervision of these officers is essential to assure the public safety. They exercise the power of state officials within a limited jurisdiction; yet, of course, they are primarily responsible to the private interest which requests their appointment. Some officers are paid no more than \$10 to \$15 per month which suggests that a major part of their salary is not paid through the State Treasury as directed. Other officers are paid as much as \$800 per month. Some officers have continued to exercise authority supported by a photostat of their commission, after their commissions had been recalled by the Governor. Still other officers have exercised the powers of deputy sheriff completely without authorization.

Controlling the special local peace officers is an expensive process. The present total income from application fees amounts to an average of about \$250.00 per year. This amount is less than 5% of the actual cost of administration. These officers clearly serve an interest which is private. Little justification can be found for the public supporting this function. Those property owners who derive direct and personal benefits from the activities of special local peace officers should finance their administration.

The full time of one clerical employee is required at present to administer the program in the Adjutant General's office. In addition the secretary to the Adjutant General also serves as supervisor of special local peace officers, and the Adjutant General himself must devote considerable time to this function. The Adjutant General recommends the appointment of a director of special local peace officers who would administer this program under the supervision of the Adjutant General. Such a directorship should be part-time, and a substantial part of the employee's time could be allocated to other functions. The total cost of a director, secretary and supplies probably would be in the vicinity of \$5,000, the figure originally set by Governor Chandler.

To make the special local peace officer program self-supporting with

the present approximately 200 officers would require a qualification fee of \$25.00 per year or \$100 for the four-year term. The assumption is that such officers must be worth this amount to their employers. No special service is performed which would appear to justify this expenditure from public funds.

Since the administration of special local peace officers is assigned to the Adjutant General by executive order and not by statute, the suggestion has also been made that this function might be appropriately transferred to the Kentucky State Police. Statutory responsibility for this function is assigned to the Governor.

As has been indicated, Governor Chandler delegated the administration of this function to the Adjutant General. Subsequent Governors have not modified this arrangement. Governor Earle C. Clements declined to effect this transfer when the possibility was suggested to him.

These general arguments may be advanced for keeping the program in the Adjutant General's bailiwick: (1) The Commissioner of State Police administers a state-wide police organization. The tendency might be to integrate the special local peace officers into this system. However, the problems involved are different. The Governor is assigned direct statutory responsibility for special local peace officers. (2) The Adjutant General's office is located in the same building as that of the Governor which facilitates prompt cooperation in the solution of problems which arise frequently in the administration of special local peace officers. (3) Perhaps the strongest argument is that the governors seem to have wanted the job done through the Adjutant General.

Some plausible arguments may also be made for assigning the job to the State Police.

(1) In the first place, the State Police have the records and established procedures for investigating applicants for these appointments.

(2) With their field organization covering the State, on-the-ground contacts are readily possible if any of a number of possible circumstances indicate a need, except in Louisville where the State Police do not operate and where over fifty percent of the special local peace officers are located.

(3) There is a functional relationship between these specialized protection activities and the general law enforcement duties and powers of the Kentucky State Police.
