Governor To Address 30th Guard Association Meeting

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House Resolution Will Authorize Construction

One of the greatest Armory building programs in the history of the Commonwealth and the Kentucky National Guard is seen as very likely to occur during fiscal year 1962. It was pointed out recently by Major General Arthur Y. Lloyd.

As part of President Kennedy's move to spur the nation's economy and with the efforts of Kentucky's Senators and Congressmen, House Resolution (HR # 5000) has been drawn up to authorize a great deal of Armory construction in the Nation. HR # 5000 has already

Twenty additional spaces have been added to the next class of the Kentucky National Guard's Officer Candidate School and the additional allotment will permit the acceptance of sixty applicants for the year long course which starts at Summer Field Training at Camp Breckinridge in July.

Maj. Gen. A. Y. Lloyd reports that at this time, "the greatest number of opportunities for advancement and promotion exist for the young officer therefore now is the best time for enlisted personnel, who can qualify themselves, to consider seeking a commission."

General Buster Given Federal Recognition

William R. Buster, the Commanding General of the XXIII Corps Artillery and the Assistant Adjutant General of Kentucky recently received federal recognition of his promotion to Brigadier General.

The Senate action approving his promotion was announced by Major General R. V. Lee, Adjutant General for the United States Army.

General Buster has been associated with the National Guard since November of 1953 when he was appointed Assistant Corps Artillery Officer. He held this position until July of 1960 when he became the Corps Artillery Commander.

The Senate has federally recognized both General Officers in the Army National Guard now. Major General Arthur Y. Lloyd, Adjutant General for State of Kentucky received his federal recognition as a Major General on July 6th of last year.

With the exception of a five year tour in the Army Reserves, Colonel Small has been associated with the Kentucky National Guard since March of 1925. He presently is assigned as G-3 on the State Headquarters Staff. Prior to his move to Washington, he was the Chief of Staff on the State Headquarters Staff.

Applications for the next class will be accepted until May 15th. Some of the requirements to be accepted for the course are: the applicant must be 21 to 28 years old; they must meet the physical standards prescribed for a commission; they must have been in the National Guard for two years to include two summer field training sessions, or one year to either include six months of active duty or a previous tour of active duty. Other requirements are listed in NGR 46.

Interested personnel are encouraged to see their unit commanders or their unit AST immediately.

THE AG SPEAKS

When I was a boy a term frequently used in most families was that of "Spring house cleaning." This meant that not only were houses completely cleaned and made to shine, but it also meant the men hauled off or burned the rubbish of winter, cleaned out barns, painted fences and generally improved the appearance of the entire homestead.

This same spirit was manifest in many communities where the Mayor declared a clean-up day or week in which everyone pitched in and improved the appearance of the town. You don't hear too much about that type of thing today but the idea has great merit.

I am concerned over the appearance, both inside and out, of some of our Armories and military facilities scattered over the State. I hope that the men of all Units will consider means by which the appearances of these facilities can be improved. Some of the recently completed Armories need grass plots, flowers and shrubbery. The older buildings, with careful planning and initiative, can also be materially improved.

I have asked Colonel Small, Director of the Facilities Division, and the State staff to work up some type of content through which a Unit's initiative and work toward beautification and Army improvement, can be judged and rewarded by some type of suitable recognition.

Actually there should be two awards, one for the best over-all appearance of the Armory and another for the greatest improvement during the year using possibly "before and after" photographs as evidence in addition to inspections.

Units that already have adequate Armories need to improve them and beautify the grounds so that their military home will be an asset to the community rather than a detriment. Some of you may say that the primary purpose of the National Guard is to train men for their military missions rather than have an Armory in which their community takes pride in showing off to visitors.

That is true, but I have noticed that in many respects the Armory reflects

Colonel Webster To Command KyANG Wing

Air Guardsmen Perform Missions In Alaska

Kentucky Air Guardsmen have proved once again that they can take their place along side the regulars and perform vital missions for the Air Force while simultaneously undergoing valuable training and therefore saving the Government much needed dollars for other defense projects. This fact became very evident when a handful of Kentucky Air Guardsmen donned their arctic parkas and mukluks and flew 72 sorties in the brief period of six days during the joint Air Force and Army operation "Exercise Willow Freeze".

The Kentucky Air National Guard supplied a force of 46 highly trained officers and airmen. They were placed on active duty status, boarded seven B-57 jet aircraft, and five C-119 aircraft, and left for Elmendorf AFB located near Anchorage Alaska on February 4th.

After arrival, the problems and handicaps facing the airmen were taken in stride. Preflight preparations took about two hours each morning due primarily to the necessary deicing practices. In addition to the sorties in the Gulkana area for Exercise Willow Freeze, pilots staged out of Galena and King Salmon shooting aerial pictures of major radar sites for the Alaskan

Air Command. Flights ranged as far north as Point Barrow and as far west as St. Lawrence Island over some of the most frigid and barren regions of Alaska.

Brigadier General William D. Ott, Deputy Air Adjutant General for Kentucky performed the duties of Liaison Officer between the Task Force and the Alaskan Air Command.

Tactical Aircrews departed Elmendorf 14 February and began arriving at Shewmaker around noon time on 15 February. Support Crews in C-119's left Elmendorf on 15 February some arriving home on 17 February while others were delayed due to hazardous weather conditions until 19 February.

Senior Army Advisor To Retire In May

Lt. Col. James R. Dorman Jr., Acting Senior Army Advisor for the Kentucky Army National Guard and Army Advisor for the XXIII Corps Artillery, will retire from active military service on May 31. This will bring to a close a military career spanning 35 years, 2 months and 17 days.

Colonel Dorman, a native of Jessamine County, Kentucky plans to enter private business in the State and make his permanent residence in Louisville.

Colonel Arthur B. Jeffrey, presently on overseas assignment to Vietnam, will replace Colonel Dorman as Senior Army Advisor.

Guardsmen Perform Emergency Duty After Snow Storm

The heavy snow and sleet storm which ushered in the close of February this year, caused 2 Kentucky National Guard organizations to perform several hours of emergency duty. Twelve members of the 1st Howitzer Battalion in Louisville and seven members of Battery C of the 2nd Howitzer Battalion were alerted for the special duty.

Most of the State had received approximately ten inches of snow which quickly drifted to depths of ten feet in winds in excess of 30 miles per hour.

In Louisville, the members of the 1st Howitzer Bn. were given the assignment to provide emergency transportation for 33 boy scouts of Louisville's Troop 346 who had been forced to stretch their provisions since the storm had caused them to stay an extra night at Camp Covered Bridge in Prospect, Ky. Part of the same detachment also aided in the rescue of 48 boys of Troop 109 who spent an extra night at Wyandotte Cave, 11 miles West of Corydon, Indiana.

The operation was arranged by Lt. Col. C. J. Cronan, III, the Battalion Commander and part of the special detachment was directed by Capt. Walter W. Woods, of Battery C, 1st Howitzer Bn.

In Bardstown, 1st Lt. H. Oakley Loy, CO of Battery C, 2nd Howitzer Battalion alerted 7 members of his unit on February 27th to use equipment to break through a snow-bound area on Plum Run Road, a side road near Bardstown, so that emergency aid could be provided a heart attack victim. The break-through attempt was unsuccessful until the following morning when the services of a grader completed the job of opening the road.



Miniature Supermarket 'Sells' NG Units Office Supplies, Merchandise

The biggest-little supermarket in the state is now booming with activity as the U. S. Property and Fiscal Office's Self-service Supply Store begins equipping each of the KYARNG's 60 units, companies and detachments with expendable supplies for the 1961 ANACDUTRA sessions.

This supermarket, although it definitely does not sell food and is not equipped with glistening neon signs and store fronts, boasts pushcarts and 800 items.

In spite of the large business, fully 80 per cent of the Guardsmen in Kentucky probably doesn't realize that the store exists. Advertisements just are not budgeted for the market.

Expendable supplies, ranging from paper clips to hand tools and from rank insignia to janitorial equipment, are stocked for Kentucky units in a small cage-like store at the Boone National Guard Military Center in Frankfort and are under the supervision of Sgt. Charles E. Hillard Jr.

Hillard, of Frankfort, a civilian employee working under the Kentucky Department of Military Affairs and assigned to the USP&FO, holds down the title of store manager for the supermarket. He is responsible for all items and the accounting chores connected with purchases.

Two representatives of each organization in the State Guard are authorized to visit the supply store on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of each week. Other working days at the store find Hillard filling mail orders from units located too far from Frankfort to make personal visits practical.

Visitors at the store stroll through wall shelves and counters filling regular shopping carts with purchases and finally checking out with Hillard at the exit.

Payment is not on a cash basis, even though the store logged \$10,000 worth of products through its shelves last year. Monetary allowance credits are based on the strength of each unit and allowances for the 1961 camp range from \$370 for Headquarters and Hq. Battery of the XXIII Corps Artillery to \$25 for the 202nd Army Band.

Even though the State sets up exactly how much money may be spent by any given organization, commanders request and receive what they need in order to meet supply requests without

showing surplus material on company books and to avoid abandonment of supplies in the field.

Mail orders are delivered to units by the Blue Grass Express or by regular mails and charges are also included and tabulated by mail.

DID YOU KNOW . . . that the Fourth Regiment Infantry, Kentucky Volunteers, Confederate States Army fired the last shot for the Confederacy, east of the Mississippi River. On the 29th day of April, 1865, five companies of this regiment, under command of Captain John H. Weller, then Acting Lieutenant Colonel, were engaged with the rear guard of Potter's Division, when a courier brought them the news that General Joseph E. Johnston had surrendered them on April 26th. The regiment then proceeded to Washington, Georgia, where they were paroled May 6th, 1865.

passed the House and presently is waiting approval of the Senate.

Providing that HR # 5000 is enacted by the congress and the necessary funds are appropriated for Armory construction, five new armories could be put under construction in Kentucky during this next fiscal year. The Armories will be located in Glasgow, Hopkinsville, Marion, Campbellsville and Monticello.

Should all five armories be started during the next fiscal year, this will bring the total of Armories under construction in the State to nine.

Presently under construction is the Middlesboro Armory, which is nearing completion; a one unit Armory at Bardston on which work started this month; a seven unit Armory in Louisville on which bids are now being received, and the plans and specifications have just been completed on a new Armory for Barbourville and construction should start there in June.

Lt. Col. Calvert P. Small, Chief of the Facilities Division for the Military Department, said that if the "go ahead" signal is received on the five new armories which have been requested, "every effort will be made to get them all under construction during the coming fiscal year."
