LARGE CROWD WATCHES HONOR GUARD AT JACKSON

TWO NEW ARMORIES DEDICATED

Dedication of two Kentucky National Guard armories, representing a total cost of \$368,565, highlighted Army Guard activities in the first-half of fiscal year 1961.

The armories, newest in the chain of permanent installations for the Guard in Kentucky, were officially opened in Tompkinsville on August 12 and in Jackson on October 23.

The Tompkinsville Armory, built at a cost of \$197,565, is now the home of Battery A of the Fourth Howitzer Battalion. The battery is commanded by Capt. Joe L. Travis.

Company C of the 201st Engineer Battalion, commanded by Capt. William S. Dalton, is now comfortably housed under the roof of a \$171,000 structure at Jackson.

Land for the armories was donated by the Grandview Development Association in Tompkinsville and the men of Company C purchased and donated the armory site in Jackson.

The dedication ceremonies in Tompkinsville were held in conjunction with the Monroe County Fair which uses property adjacent to the armory site.

Kentucky's Governor Bert Combs and Adjutant General A. Y. Lloyd were the guest speakers at the dedication. A 19-gun salute in honor of Governor Combs, was fired on his arrival at Tompkinsville.

During official ceremonies General Lloyd presented a flag to Capt. Travis, the first 50 star flag to be presented to a unit of the Ken-

tucky National Guard. Music for the ceremonies was provided by the 101st Airborne Division Band.

At the Jackson ceremony, Brigadier General William R. Buster, Assistant Adjutant General gave the dedication speech. Prior to the actual dedication, Captain Dalton's unit and the 202nd Army Band from Ashland formed an honor guard for General Buster, which included an eleven gun salute.

Tours of the respective building and displays of Guard equipment were offered guests following official ceremonies.

Two new armories were dedicated during the last half of fiscal year 1960. They are located at Olive Hill and Carrollton.

ANACDUTRA DATES ANNOUNCED FOR 1961

Artillery units, including XXIII Corps Artillery, 138th Artillery Group; First, Second, Third and Fourth Howitzer Battalion; Fifth Observation Battalion, Battery A, Searchlight and also State Hq Detachment; 413th Ordnance Company; 103d Signal Co., 202d Army Band and Ky ARNG OCS, will attend camp at Camp Breckinridge, July 22nd through August 5th.

The 201st Engineer Battalion and the 207th Engineer Company will train at Fort Belvoir, Va., July 29th through August 12th.

DELEGATES PRESENT FINAL CONTRIBUTION TO BUILDING FUND

Delegates to the Eighty-Second General Conference of the National Guard Association of the United States saw Kentucky present a check for \$4,827.50 to the Association as their final contribution toward the National Guard Memorial Building Fund.

Major General Arthur Y. Lloyd, AG of Kentucky, served as Chairman of the 2nd Army Caucus Committee, the first time a Kentuckian had held that position in a great number of years. Lt. Col. W. W. Ensminger, of Kentucky, was a member of the same committee.

The annual Conference was held October 10-14 at the famed Hawaiian Village Hotel in Honolulu, Hawaii.

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DID YOU KNOW - what the official uniform of the Kentucky Militia looked like in the War of 1812?

Military historians didn't even know that an official uniform existed for the Militia until recent years. Through painstaking research in American and British military records, however, artists are now able to make a composite that comes hairline close to being authentic.

In 1959, the Company of Military Historians and Collectors published the above picture entitled **KENTUCKY MILITIA, AT THE RIVER RASIN**, Jan. 1813.

It shows the Militiaman wearing a black felt hat and a gray colored shirt made of "lindsay woolsy," a widely used common cloth that was produced on the frontier.

An oblong blanket, also gray served as an overcoat. It was made of heavy wool and had a large black stripe near each end.

The Militiaman's weapon was a 1795 US Springfield .69 caliber Musket manufactured at the armory in Springfield, Massachusetts. It was copied from a French model of the period, the Charville Musket, standard weapon of the French troops.

THE AG SPEAKS

There is something about a New Year that is conducive to new ideas, new achievements and new goals for the future. The publication of The Kentucky Guardsman opens the door to a new and informative news media for the members of our organization. Being the "first of its kind" insofar as publication by the Kentucky National Guard is concerned—it is intended to interest and inform you of the activities of our Kentucky National Guard program. I congratulate the staff of The Kentucky Guardsmen for its efforts resulting in this publication and urge the continued interest and support of all the Kentucky National Guard in assuring its success.

At the outset of a New Year, it is proper that we look realistically at the accomplishments of the past year. 1960 saw the Army National Guard continuing its efforts to reconstitute an effective program after the alarming decrease in strength resulting from the reorganization of 1959 in which Kentucky lost fifteen units. By means of a vigorous recruitment program, the ARNG rebuilt to a current strength of 4,751. In addition to regular training, a number of Kentucky Guardsmen participated in state active service during 1960, performing duty in "Operation Snowstorm" at Bowling Green, Williamsburg and London in March 1960; supporting local law officials at Churchill Downs in Louisville; aiding law officials during the Mountain Laurel Festival in May 1960, and distributing application forms for the Veterans Bonus to each of the 120 counties in July 1960.

Community service and good will efforts by the 201st Engineer's Company C, were reviewed in a word and picture story in the November issue of The National Guardsman.

New Armories were dedicated at Olive Hill, Tompkinsville, Jackson and Carrollton during the year. The 1960 General Assembly appropriated sufficient funds that, when matched by the Federal Funds on a 25%-75% basis, will insure completion of our present armory at Middlesboro, and Armories at Louisville, Barbourville and Bardstown are in the planning stage. It is anticipated that these three armories will be completed within the next fiscal year.

Shewmaker ANG Base at Louisville was formally dedicated in 1960, as well as a new Operations and Training Building at the base. The ANG now occupies a new base completely equipped with all new buildings and facilities. In April of 1960 the ANG underwent reorganization resulting in a current strength of 785—an overall increase of 77 members. The 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Wing achieved an enviable flight safety program during 1960, and the USAF recognized this achievement by awarding the Wing its Flight Safety Plaque. This unit was one of six wings throughout the US recognized by the AF as being operationally ready for its Federal mission. The Kentucky ANG starts off 1961 by
