**WE PICK UP A T-29:** Called a "Flying Classroom" by the USAF, the next support aircraft for the unit looks like a T-29. We're scheduled to pick one up by Aug. 28 although it may be October or November before pilots and maintenance crews really get checked out to operate it. This Convair flies on a pair of piston-driven Pratt and Whitney engines of 2,500 horses each. Its wing span is listed as 91 feet-8 inches, length as 74 feet-8 inches, and height as 27 feet-4 inches. It goes about 300 mph, flies above 25,000 feet, and ranges about 1,000 miles. Maximum gross weight is 44,500 pounds.

**DINING-IN #2 IS OCT. 5:** Maj. Gen. Richard L. Frymire has announced that all officers of the Kentucky Air and Army National Guard will gather Oct. 5 at the Ramada Inn/Bluegrass Convention Center on Hurstbourne Lane for the second annual dining-in in honor of new officers.
